

Monaco And Genoa.

(From a letter to The Monitor, San Francisco.)

Nice has its history too, dating back so far as 350, when it was founded by the Massalies, taking its name from the word 'ma' (victory) in honor of a battle won by the Phoenicians against the Ligurians.

From Nice we went to Monaco, and thus passed out of France. We had entered another foreign land, but not a very extensive one. Its total population is only about 16,000; it does not cover 360 acres—the size of a little ranch!

Here at last, then, was one of those little principalities, the like of which novelties delight in interesting for purposes of romance and imaginary adventure, a distinct and separate country, despite its diminutive size.

Genoa was a happy surprise. I hardly know just in what spirit I approached it. It had not been 'boosted,' it seemed to me, like many other cities on the route. I thought of it only as the city of Christopher Columbus.

How ever they have other reasons to smile. They pay no tax! And lately—but they had to frown to accomplish it—they vote and have a hand in the pie of their own government, without paying a cent for the privilege!

The Capital of Monaco, the City of Monaco itself, presents a sight so wonderfully picturesque, one has to rub his eyes to make sure he is not gazing at a picture painted from imagination. The city stands on a cape which is nothing but a great impregnable rock.

In the valley between the capital and Monte Carlo, which is the second important city of Monaco, lies the third and last city of this taxless nation—Condamine. Condamine is where the people live—in contradistinction to Monaco, where the Prince lives, and Monte Carlo, where no one lives, but where all the world comes to throw away its money.

At Monte Carlo souls as well as fortunes are lost—as I realized with a shiver when our special policemen 'detailed to watch for suicides' were pointed out to me. And Monte Carlo is a place so beautiful, so endowed by nature with the most alluring attractiveness, such an exquisite grouping of sheltering mountains, of blue sea and jutting rocks of flowers and palms and singing birds, a place so beautiful that it seemed to me uncaringly and weirdly lovely with the blighting glory of Lucifer himself.

I watched the gamblers at play, and in some faces, and in some feverish eyes, I saw not the beauty, but the light as plain as day. Others played care-free, 'for the fun of it,' toying with fire. There was young and old there, all intent on the cards or the roulette, while over all the place hung such a deadly silence that it pressed and not all the brightness and gaudiness of the magnificent Casino could charm away the horrible sense of evil that brooded there.

It was then that I thought that I would rather live elsewhere and pay taxes than be a citizen of Monaco.

After Monaco we touch French territory again, but it is a rather curious community we enter, Beausoleil is the place, which, for its ancient history, dates back to the year 1905. Beausoleil is just seven years old, and it owes its origin to the growing prosperity of Monaco, which 'ran over,' as it were a few years ago, its population overflowing its boundaries, tradesmen and workmen being forced to establish a new town for themselves, since there is no more room in Monaco!
