Canada is adopting a system of war saving stamps, a plan which has been wonderfully successful in the United States and elsewhere.

Anyone desiring to save in this way should first of all go to a post office for a bank, or elsewhere as designated, and in four dollars and receive a war savings certificate.

of the agencies for a war savings stamp. The certificate may be registered at any post office so that you can secure payment in cash even if the certificate is lost.

Get this thing clearly: There are two kinds of stamps and two kinds of cards—the thrift stamp and the thrift card, and the war savings stamp and the war savings certificate.

Nothing But Justice.

Speaking at a luncheon given by himself to Sir Robert Borden in London, General Turner expressed the overseas forces gratitude for the manner in which the Canadian Government had supported them throughout the war.

Sir George Foster, it is learned at Ottawa, has been named on a committee of the war cabinet to prepare Canada's claim for reparation against Germany.

The surrender of the 20th German airplanes required under the terms of the armistice convention has been proceeding during the past week and it is expected the full complement of enemy machines will be in the Allies' hands.
