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Financial and Commercial Markets

EDMONTON CITY MARKET.

Edmonton, Nov. 23.—With a steady demand for farm products, prices are holding their own in Edmonton, although there has been little change in market conditions for the last week. While everybody wants to stock up on potatoes, the supply thus far is more than equal to the demand, and quotations are about the same. Good tubers are bringing from 40 to 45c per bushel, with every prospect of stiffer prices in the next few days. A few are complaining of having purchased potatoes which were frost-bitten, indicating that probably some failed to take the necessary precaution during the recent cold snap. Other vegetables are selling at the prices they have prevailed for nearly a month.

Grain prices are still weak, if anything weaker than a few days ago. Oats have advanced from 34 to 37 to 32 to 35 cents per bushel. Corn is 40 to 42 cents. The elevators are doing a fairly good business with the farmers.

PHILLIP MARKS OPENING SESSION
Strong Denunciation in American Congress by Representative of the Call of American Anti-Trust League. Large Number of Questions to be Disposed of.

Washington, Dec. 4.—Congress re-assembled to-day and presented the sensational spectacle of an opening day-Phillips, a speech by Representative Lattimore, of New York, a Democratic, who for seventy minutes weighed against the so-called American Anti-Trust League. The organization had attacked him in connection with his attitude toward the so-called anti-trust inquiry. Close up to that speech to which Democrats and Republicans alike accorded round after round of applause, Republican Leader Lamm, in a ready and stirring manner, in which the New York member was held, called for a formal investigation of the affairs to blacken the character of Mr. Lattimore.

The session is counted to deal with the tariff, trusts, currency, arbitration and a host of other problems but all activity will be with a view to the effect on the coming presidential campaign.

Vice-President Sherman and Speaker Clark respectively called the two houses to order. There was an exceptionally full attendance of senators and representatives. The galleries in both chambers were jam-packed to accommodate all the visitors. Party lines and personal differences were seemingly obliterated in the exchange of greetings.

Sir Edward Clouston Retires.
Montreal, Dec. 4.—At the annual general meeting of the Bank of Montreal to-day, President R. B. Angus announced the resignation of Sir Edward Clouston as general manager, and the appointment in his place of R. Vincent Meredith. Sir Edward has been general manager for twenty years and was 42 years of age. The announcement was made that henceforth the rest account would not be permitted to exceed the paid-up capital and that the surplus would be divided among the shareholders.

Two Hanged at New Westminster.
New Westminster, Dec. 4.—Henry Jones, who killed his wife last Aug. 30th, and Irishman, a Japanese, who murdered a fellow countryman in northern British Columbia, were hanged here today. The execution was devoid of unusual incident. Jones shot his wife, following a long series of quarrels. He was sixty years of age and he and his wife had two grown sons.

Another Insurrection in Mexico.
Torreon, Mexico, Dec. 5.—Alarmed by reports that the city is soon to be the scene of an insurrection, the foreign colonies have petitioned the consular offices to request military protection. Secret service agents of the government claim to have information that 500 rifles and 2,000 rounds of ammunition have been distributed among the laboring men of the district, who accepted them with the understanding that they will rise in revolt. The district was the uprising was planned for December 10th.

Chicago, Dec. 6.—The local market was quiet and inactive up to the close. Although cables from British and Continental exchanges were all weaker on more favorable reports from the Argentine. Prices were comparative-ly steady. There was a continuation today of the poor cash demand which has been prevalent for the last day or two.

While there were fair enquiries for low grade stuff for export purposes to complete old contracts, the trade in contract grades was very slow. In futures, the Winnipeg market was very narrow. December closed at 94.3 or 1.8c lower than yesterday after a 2.8c range, while May (old) closed at 91.4 or 1.4c lower, and May (new) at 91.4 or 1.4c lower, after a 1.2c range. The Chicago market closed unchanged to 2.8c lower, while Minneapolis closed 1.8c split to 3.4c lower. There was a further fall in oat prices, Winnipeg, December closing at 37.13 or 1.4c lower, and May at 40.23 or 1.4c lower also.

Chicago oats were 1.4 to 3.5c lower at the close. There was a slight recovery in the fax market, Winnipeg closing 1-2c higher for December, and one cent higher for May. The Duluth market was also stronger, closing 1-2c being 1-2c to 2c higher.

FOR TELEPHONES AND ROADS AND BRIDGES

Government Will Ask Legislature's Approval of Resolution Authorizing Extension of Loan.

On Wednesday, Premier Sifton, in accordance with notice given Monday day, will move that the house resolve itself into committee of the whole to consider a resolution authorizing the raising of a loan of \$5,000,000 for the extension of telephones, roads and bridges.

A copy of the motion to be made in committee on Wednesday is as follows: That it is expedient to provide that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, in Council from time to time to authorize the provincial treasurer to raise, by way of loan upon the credit of the province, such sum or sums of money, not to exceed in the whole five million dollars, for all or any of the purposes following, that is to say:

For the extension of the provincial telephone system, and for the establishment and construction of trunk roads with the necessary bridges thereon, and that the aforesaid sums of money may be borrowed from time to time, terms not exceeding fifty years, at a rate not exceeding four per cent, per annum, and shall be raised upon the credit of the general revenue fund of Alberta, and shall be chargeable thereon.

Report of University Governors.
The report of the board of governors of the University of Alberta for the year ending June 30, 1911, was presented to the House Monday afternoon by the Hon. C. R. Mitchell. The report consists of two parts, part one the report of the president on the academic work of the University and part two the financial statement.

The financial statement for the year ending June 30, 1911, shows cash receipts to have been \$41,380.11, disbursements total \$41,380.11. The current revenue account for the year shows the income to have been \$25,909.28 and expenditures \$24,082.43 from the provincial government, and the principal item in expenditures was \$27,829.72 in salaries.

A summary shows the surplus or revenue account 1909-10 to be \$15,782.37, and the deficit for 1910-11 to be \$17,652.37, leaving a net surplus of \$8,959.97.
