Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

HENIA, Ohio, May 21.
Fred Southward, amateur aviator,
fell 100 feet from his ship to-day and
was killed.

HALIFAX, May 21.
A cable from London announces the
death this morning of Lieut.-General
Winburn Lawrie, C.B., aged 77.

DOVER, Eng., May 21.
Crombers, a Belgium airman, cross-
ed the English Channel from Nieu-
port, Belgium, from whence he start-
ed this morning.

HAVANA, May 21.
The Cuban Government disclaims
any further knowledge regarding the
uprising of the negroes. The opinion
is spreading generally that the condi-
tions are becoming serious, and it is
reported that two armed parties are
operating in Matanzas province. Or-
ders were issued this morning for ad-
ditional troops to be prepared to take
the field.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 21.
After the surprising declaration
that there are 2,000 churches in the
United States without pastors had
been made at the General Assembly of
the Presbyterian Church to-day, reso-
lutions were adopted urging all Pres-
byterian Commissions of Laymen to
keep in close touch with young men
who might be possible candidates for
the ministry.

LONDON, May 21.
Second officer Lightoller of the Ti-
tanic was the chief witness on the
stand to-day. His evidence was prac-
tically a repetition of that given be-
fore the United States Senate Commit-
tee. He stuck to the belief that the
light seen by the Titanic was not
more than five miles away, and that
there was no field ice to prevent the
vessel coming to the Titanic's aid.

LONDON, May 21.
The Miners' Federation met to-day
to discuss with the District Boards
the decision arrived at as regards the
various minimum scale of wages
throughout the coal fields. There was
much dissatisfaction, particularly over
the South of Wales scale, which
was considered to be against the men.
It is believed that the Government
will be appealed to for further legis-
lation to reorganize the District
Boards.

LONDON, May 21.
Viscount Haldane leaves for Berlin
to continue his mission begun last
spring in preparing the ground for in-
ternational conversations with lead-
ing statesmen and prominent persons
in Germany, with a view to a move-
ment toward the restriction of arma-
ments among European powers and
improving international relations.
Haldane expects to remain ten or
twelve days in the German capital,
and hopes to make more noticeable
progress than during the previous vis-
it in February last.

LONDON, May 21.
With an apology offered in court,
Winston Spencer Churchill ended the
off-repeated accusation that he broke
parole when he was a prisoner in
Pretoria during the Boer War. This
time it was reported by a writer in
Blackwood's Magazine, and led to a
libel action, which was settled yester-
day by a complete withdrawal of the
allegations. Churchill relating in the
witness box the circumstances of his
escape from Pretoria, said he never
broke parole, because he was not
asked for it. He accepted the defend-
ant magazine's apology, whereupon
the judge permitted the suit to be
withdrawn.

The schr. Michael Francis, owned
by James Baird, Ltd., arrived here
from Channel yesterday morning after
a record run. She came down in 45
hours, and from the time of leaving
carried every stitch of canvas on her.
The schooner has on board a cargo
of seals hauled at Channel and
neighbourhood during the past spring.

Mr. John P. McCormick

STANDS WELL AT CAMBRIDGE,
MASS.

The re-appointment Tuesday, by
Mayor Barry, and the immediate con-
firmation by the board of aldermen,
of John P. McCormick, as register of
voters, marked the beginning of his
fourth consecutive term as a member
of the board. Named in 1900 by May-
or Champlin, re-appointed at the close
of his four-year term by Mayor Daly,
and in 1898 re-appointed by Mayor
Wardell, each time as a Democratic
representative on the board, he had
achieved an enviable reputation for
faithfulness and efficiency, as was
well evidenced by his election in 1908
as chairman of the board, which posi-
tion he relinquished this year in
favor of J. Frank Fahey.

The recognition paid by Mayor
Barry in re-appointing Mr. McCormick
is gratifying to his many friends
throughout the city, which has been
his home since 1869. To none was
the news of his re-appointment more
pleasing than to his colleagues on
the board of registrars and to those
who have been his associates in the
past.

flattering as well as compliment-
ary to our esteemed fellow country-
man.

John P. McCormick is a native of
the City of St. John's, having emi-
grated in his early manhood and ex-
tensively travelled over Uncle Sam's
domain in his younger days. His
principal characteristics are love and
patriotism for the land of his birth,
and often his heart will swell with
emotional feeling in a foreign land as
he tells the anecdotes of his ice-hunt-
ing to a group of his countrymen.

John was one of the old crews who
manned the sailing fleet
When thirty men, both stout and jolly,
Went to the toe with big John Holley.

In an address before the Newfound-
land Advancement Association last
year he related many amusing inci-
dents of his various travels. I met
a man, said Mr. McCormick, on the
Pacific Coast who lived as a railway
section hand with his dog in a log
shanty. As I approached the door
even the dog barked me a welcome.
This man had not seen his home for
many years. I was the same, and I

fellow-feeling I assure you made us
wonderous kind. We went to bed
that night not to sleep but to catch
more codfish and haul more seals than
ever Arthur Jackman dreamed of
in his palmist days. Mr. McCormick
came east and settled in Cam-
bridge in the early sixties and from
then till now has always been esteem-
ed as one of the most popular and
prominent citizens. No Newfound-
lander ever appealed to him for any
favour was ever denied, and to-day
friends of all nationalities and his
countrymen in particular are glad to
have the opportunity to shower on
him their congratulations as he en-
ters his fourth term as Registrar of
Votes for the City of Cambridge.
