

Two Kinds of Memory.

Did you ever happen to notice in studying yourself and those around you, that there are two distinct kinds of memory possessed by different people; the mental memory and the visual memory.

That is, some people remember everything as facts in relation to other facts, while other people remember everything visually as if their minds contained photographic imprints of the scenes or events.

Perhaps that isn't entirely plain to you. Let me try to make it simpler by a concrete example.

I have a friend who has the visual memory in a very strong form. Now, I have a terrible faculty for losing things. One day when I was shopping I met this friend. We talked for two or three minutes and then I passed on. Sometime during the day I managed to mislay an important bundle. To assist me in my investigations, I wanted to find at what time I lost it, and so called up my friend and asked her if I had had that bundle in my possession when she saw me. She knew at once. "Yes, you had it under your right arm," she said. "You had two smaller bundles under your left arm, and your wrist bag on your left wrist."

I have no doubt that she could have gone on and described every detail of my costume from the crown of my hat to the rubber heels on my walking shoes.

That's what I mean by visual memory. I can never remember how people look; I cannot even clearly call up the faces of those I love best when I am absent from them. Fugitive glimpses will sometimes come to me uncalled, but when I make a deliberate effort to recall a face I cannot get it at all.

"King With the Blood-Stained Hands."

Peter Karageorgievitch, ruler of Servia, "the king with the blood-stained hands," celebrated his 69th birthday recently. The object in a "holy war" against the Turks, the aged monarch of the Serbs now hopes to further rehabilitate his tarnished reputation by writing a volume of memoirs in which he will present to the world his version of the tragedy of a decade ago, which placed him on his blood-spattered throne in June, just six years ago, that the vile and unpeppery King Alexander, last of the Obrenovitchs, and his courtiers, Draga, were murdered in the royal palace at Belgrade. Although Peter has shown himself a wise and valiant ruler, the circumstances which led to the death of the throne have made him an alien in most of the royal courts of Europe. Inevitably ferdinand and barbaric was the assassination of the insane Alexander and the prostitute, twenty years his senior, whom he had raised to his throne, the crime was not without extenuating features. Alexander, with a madman's lust for blood that was constantly fired by Queen Draga, recklessly ordered wholesale arrests and executions. The last straw was placed on the backs of the suffering Serbs when Draga's brother, a vile wretch engaged in an unspeakable traffic, was named heir to the throne. Servia had long been rent between two dynasties, the Obrenovitchs and the Karageorgievitchs. Alexander was a son of the former family, while Peter, the present king, was then an exile in Geneva. The leading statesmen and army officers of Servia joined in a conspiracy that had regarded for its object, and sent a committee to Geneva to see Prince Karageorgievitch and offer him the throne, should it "become vacant." Peter accepted. Then followed the mad night in the palace, when Alexander and Draga were cut to pieces and their bodies thrown into the courtyard. Two of Draga's brothers and the king's principal ministers were also slaughtered and a whole dynasty was wiped out. On the following morning, while the dogs of the street sniffed at the bones of the King and Queen, Peter I. was proclaimed ruler of Servia.

We might also paint a picture of the Hon. Minister of Finance delivering an oration on "Cullage Fisheries."




