Sir Cavendish Boyle, K. C. M. G., who died in London on September 17th, suddenly, after an operation, was the youngest son of the late Capt. Cavendish Spencer Boyle (72nd Highlanders) and married in 1914, Louise, the youngest daughter of the late Mr. Reuben Sassoon, M. V. O. Educated at Charterhouse, he became a magistrate and held other important offices in the Leeward Islands. He was the delegate for British Guiana and Bermuda in the reciprocity negotiations with the U. S. A., 1899, and became Governor of Newfoundland 1901-1904 and of the Mauritius, 1904-1911 when he retired. He received the C. M. G. in 1888. He was an associate of the Institute of Civil
