

## SPANISH INFLUENZA.

## Instructions to Outport Magistrates.

Requests are constantly being sent to the Board of Health by Outport Magistrates for instructions in dealing with the influenza epidemic. The following points are to be noted:—

1. The disease is highly contagious.
2. It is spread very largely by contact one with another.
3. It is advisable to prohibit any unnecessary gathering of people about stores, street corners, etc.
4. Close schools, churches, theatres, etc., if there is any indication of spread of disease.
5. Avoid a panic, but take this thing seriously and co-operate with the doctors, following strictly the advice given.
6. Good ventilation is very important—therefore admit sunlight and fresh air as much as possible.
7. Do not allow the patient to spit, and when coughing cover the mouth.
8. Never neglect the precaution of washing the hands before eating or after contact with a sick person.

Quarantine is difficult to establish with any degree of success and the presence of the police in an attempt to enforce quarantine would create more panic.

## TO FEDERALIZE AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, Oct. 18. (Via Basel).—Steps for the organization of Austria on a federalist basis were proclaimed by Emperor Charles to-day. The plan does not include the union of Austrian Poland with the independent Polish state. The Emperor declared the city of Trieste and the Trieste region will be treated separately "in conformity with the wishes of the people."

## "FLU" STILL ON THE INCREASE.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 18. Reports from 35 States showed that the Spanish influenza is still on the increase in most parts of the country. Conditions in army camps also were less favorable, the 4,781 cases up to noon to-day showing that the disease apparently was stationary after a marked decline noted for several days.

## CARDINAL BEGIN'S CIRCULAR.

QUEBEC, Oct. 18. His Eminence Cardinal Bevin to-day issued a circular to all the clergy of the Archdiocese of Quebec requesting pastors of every parish where the influenza exists to suppress all religious services, even low Masses on Sunday next.

## GREEK SOIL FREE OF ENEMY.

SALONIKI, Oct. 17. Greek troops to-day completed the re-occupation of the region in Greek Macedonia, which had been held by the Bulgarians and Turks.

## OBJECT TO TONE OF NOTE.

BERNE, Oct. 17. President Wilson's reply to the German note has created a new state of affairs in diplomatic discussions relative to peace. It is reported here from German sources, and the German reply, it is said, will make it clearly understood that the tone employed by the President was open to objections.

## ANTI-TOXIN FOR "FLU."

CHICAGO, Oct. 18. Dr. Louis J. Pent, former State bacteriologist, and at present connected with the research laboratory of the University of Chicago, told the Chicago Medical Society last night that he had succeeded in isolating the germs responsible for the influenza which is sweeping the country and that the regulation diphtheria antitoxin is an absolute specific for the disease.

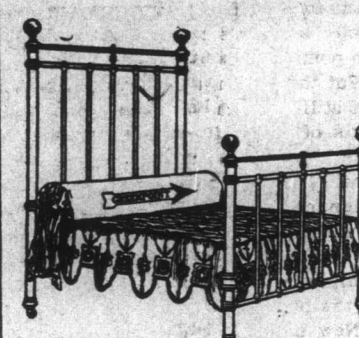

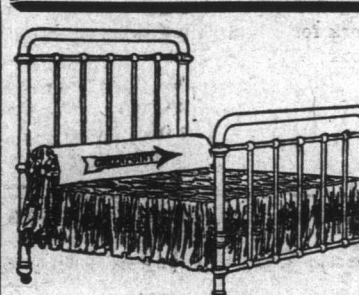
