It is five weeks since the Lewis H Smith, which is a flat roofer, left her home port and during that time she has weathered almost continuous gales during the time she had been on the Banks. Twice she has put into Halifax for repairs. She arrived here on September 17 with her foregaff and her foremast crosstrees damaged, aling repairs she left here several days later for the Banks.

Her last trip on the Banks has been the most trying Captain Nickerson and his crew had for many months visions being aboard the vessel. For two days her crew lived on fried halibut, they having a small supply of lard, which was also exhausted when the vessel reached port.

The vessel's mainsail was split in a gale off Sable Island on Wednesday and a trysail was immediately rigged.
