


Most patents are issued on combination claims, because it is only rarely that anybody discovers something absolutely new. And a patent based on combination claims is no protection to the inventor if the device can be made to work by omitting any single element of the com-

### Berlin to London by Rail

Daily Goods Train via Harwich Ferry, Every morning a train of trucks bearing the inscription of the German Imperial Railways and the names of German manufacturers arrives at Bishopsgate, London, goods station, and the contents, after passing the Customs, are loaded into lorries and taken

This has become possible by an agreement between the German railway administration and the ferry-boat company which runs the train ferry

Trucks can be loaded in any part of Germany, and when a Customs seal is ttached they are taken to Zeebrugge imbarked on the ferry, and brought into the heart of London without be-
