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BILL HURLEY HAS FAITH IN
W. C. LEAGUE

Saskatoon Boss Predicts Great Things for Organization; Also Likes His Homestead

Bill Hurley who has undertaken the job of bringing a pennant Saskatoonward in 1913 has great faith in the future of the Western Canada league and promises that if the league can go through this season successfully that next year or the year later franchises in this organization will be worth a great deal to the owners. Bill is in Calgary now with his Saskatoon Quakers ready and anxious to play the Bronchos but has been held back all this week by the weather.

"The league this year is better than any that we have ever had in Western Canada. There is only one week spot in it that I can see and that is Medicine Hat. I am not criticizing the team of that place, for Bert Dunn has got together a good bunch of players and he is backed by plenty of good game sports but the city is at yet just a little small. But it is growing rapidly and by next year should be able to support a team very well.

"Baseball is just getting nicely started in Western Canada and while it has been run at a loss for the last few years, I think that it should be a paying proposition from this time on." Bill is looking five years younger this year than last and attributes his good health to the six and a half months that he spent out on a homestead this winter. He and Ferdy Manning have adjoining homesteads. They are sixty miles from a railroad at present but by this time next year a new road will be in operation only a mile from his place. He tells stories of the vegetation in his neighborhood which would put to shame the most optimistic C.P.R. prospectus. He has great faith in the Western Canada league and still greater faith in the country of his adoption.

First Game Will be Played This Next Saturday Provided Weather Clears Up

At the Calgary City and District football league meeting held last night the schedule for the season, 1913, was officially passed with modification to the extent that the games which were scheduled for this week will have to undergo alteration owing to the interference of rain. The opening game, which was intended to be the Calles versus Rest of League, will now take place on Saturday, May 17, at Victoria park. July 9 has been reserved for the international game, and arrangements have also been made to allocate a date for the Inter-City match against Edmonton.

This year there is a possibility of a team being brought from Winnipeg to play a representative Calgary eleven, and if this materializes, there are open dates, one of which can be utilized for this purpose. The list of referees is also in the making, and it is expected with the assistance of last year's wielders of the whistle, Messrs. H. T. Shekton and James Eilgert, and others who have made application, the handling of the games will be in good hands. Efforts will also be made to arrange games with the Amateur league teams at the coast, either at Calgary or Vancouver.
