Proposed Eviction of 105 Irish Tenants.

DUBLIN, April 9.—The agent of the Marquis of Clanricarde has obtained permission for the eviction of 105 more tenants of his lordship's Irish estates.

Commercial Crisis in Argentine Feared.

BUENOS AYRES, April 9.—Heavy losses which the country has sustained through the drought, and the extremely low prices of produce have created well-grounded fears that a commercial crisis will result within the next three months.

Royal Luxury—\$31 Per Doz. for Eggs.

LONDON, April 9.—Queen Victoria will return to Windsor on April 27. As an instance of royal luxury it may be mentioned that the first of this season's plovers' eggs sold in the city market were bought up by the Queen's purveyor, who paid for them a guinea apiece.

The Bering Sea Bill.

LONDON, April 9.—The Bering Sea Bill passed its third reading in the House of Commons this evening. It passed without amendment. Sir Charles Russell having accepted Sir Richard Webster's suggestion that the clause to which the United States Government is said to object be altered in the House of Lords.

Outbreak of Cholera in Constantinople.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 9.—Cholera of a most malignant type has become so prevalent throughout the city as to cause general alarm. Callaidi Bey, a councillor of State, was attacked with the disease yesterday and died within a few hours. Soon afterward a servant of one of the members of the Greek legation was seized and he too succumbed. The Greek legation has been removed to Therapia and it is probable that foreign representatives will seek temporary quarters outside the city. The authorities are taking active measures to prevent the spread of the disease.

Thirty-Three Moslems Killed.

MADRAS, April 9.—A terrific fight has occurred in the district of Malebar between a force of Madras mounted police and a band of Malebar Moslems. The latter had committed many depredations and among their crimes it was charged they murdered a number of Hindus. A strong force of mounted police were sent from here with orders to capture the Moslems and bring them here. After a three days' search the police came upon the band and attacked them. The Moslems fought fiercely but were finally routed and the band scattered. Thirty-three Moslems were killed and a large number wounded. The casualties among the police were few.

The Tories Disappointed.

LONDON, April 9.—The Conservatives and Unionists who were expecting the defeat of the Government to-day by disaffection of the Radicals to-night on Mr. Morley's motion on the appropriate day for debating Dalziel's motion, were disappointed. The Radical members of Parliament met this evening, and agreed that the Radical members would not oppose the Government, but would support Morley's

Hatred of the British.

LONDON, April 10.—The Daily News (Tory) correspondent in Cairo says that there have been two collisions during the last two nights between British and Egyptian soldiers quartered in that city. Pickets officered by Englishmen are patrolling the streets. The trouble does not threaten to become serious but is regarded as significant of the fanatical hatred felt by natives toward the British.

Kossuth's Son in Politics.

VIENNA, April 10.—The Neue Freie Presse publishes an interview with Francis Kossuth, who has just become a subject of the King of Hungary. Young Kossuth says he will henceforth remain in Hungary, and declares his intention of taking an active part in politics. He has no intention, he says, of fomenting or encouraging any disturbance, but he will seek to carry out a part of his father's principles not yet realized, but which he believes it is yet possible to realize by perfectly legal and constitutional means.

Blown to the Winds.

BERLIN, April 10.—While a number of men were engaged in the manufacture of dynamite in a laboratory just outside of the town of Demnitz yesterday, a quantity of the dynamite became ignited and the works were blown to pieces. The bodies of three of the workmen were literally blown to the winds, while five others were so horribly mangled that they cannot live. The wreckage of the buildings was complete, some of the debris being carried half a mile away.

SOUTH AMERICAN SENSATION!

Da Gama Gets Away From the Portuguese Warship.

Reported Success of the Rebels at Rio Grande do Sul—A Government Gunboat Captured.

BUENOS AYRES, April 9.—Advices have been received here from Rio Grande do Sul that the Brazilian Government gunboat Cananea surrendered to Admiral Meilo on Friday.

Later advices state that on Saturday four transports, conveyed by a torpedo boat, forced the bar at Rio Grande do Sul and landed 4,000 insurgent troops.

Two English gunboats, the Beagle and the Race, left Montevideo for Rio Grande do Sul to-day.

The insurgent admiral, Da Gama, made his escape from the Portuguese warship Mindello at 2:15 p.m. yesterday and arrived at the Buenos Ayres quarantine station last evening. The Portuguese sailors made no resistance to his leaving the warship.

The people of the Argentine Republic generally are rejoicing over the escape of Da Gama and the reports of Meilo's successes at Rio Grande do Sul. These reports are not altogether trustworthy.

BUENOS AYRES, April 10.—Latest information confirms the report of a fierce bombardment of Rio Grande do Sul by the rebel Meilo, on land and sea. Two hundred rebels were killed, but the city was not taken. Banks have suspended and firms have failed.

TORONTO YOUNG LIBERALS.

Complete Success of Their Annual Banquet—Hon. H. L. Davies and D. C. Fraser the Chief Speakers.

TORONTO, April 9.—The Young Liberal banquet to-night passed off very successfully. Some 500 members of the club and friends were present. President F. P. Kelly presided, and over a score of Liberal members of the Legislature were present.

The feature of the evening was the attendance of a deputation of Eastern Dominion members, Hon. H. L. Davies, Hon. D. C. Fraser and Dr. Borden.

Hon. G. W. Ross and Hon. Richard Harcourt were also present, representing the Provincial Government.

GONE UP IN SMOKE.

Money Loss Caused by the Milwaukee Fire (\$25,000)—A Strathroy Blaze.

MILWAUKEE, April 9.—The total money loss occasioned by the fire to-day is about \$25,000, as follows: Theater property and stationary scenery, about \$175,000; Rosenfeld Bros., proprietors of the Laipson, \$45,000; Joseph Cluader, orchestra leader, \$3,000. The hotel property is not much damaged. The total loss of life was eight.

MILWAUKEE, April 9.—To-night the bodies of John T. Farrell, lieutenant of engine No. 1, and Thos. Morgan, pipeman of No. 1, were found in the ruins of the theater. The body of the third assistant chief, August Janssen, is the only one not yet found. All the bodies have been identified, and the number of the killed is nine.

The name of the fireman reported in the afternoon dispatches as unidentified is Frank J. Winey, aged 29 years.

PETROLKA, Ont., April 9.—Fire broke out here to-day at the Imperial Oil Company's wax works department. Loss at present unknown, but it is considerable. Insured in the following companies: Mercantile, Lancashire, North British, Queen's, Royal, British-American and Western.

STRATHROY, Ont., April 9.—This morning about 4 o'clock fire was discovered in the kitchen of the residence of Mr. J. E. Butler, Front street, and before the progress of the flames could be stopped the entire back premises were destroyed with loss of the contents. The fire also got strong hold on the main part of the building and gutted it quite freely. Most of the contents of the front part were removed. Loss on the building probably \$12,000, insured for \$1,500. Loss on contents probably \$800, insured for \$1,500.

BELOWOOD, Ont., April 10.—The greatest calamity that ever befell Belowood was the burning of the elevator last night. The building was insured. There were about 1,000 bushels of grain in store. The loss on building and machinery is about \$6,000; insured for \$4,000. Cause mystery.

A DOWN-EAST ELIZARI

The Lower Provinces Visited Great Storm.

Worst Blizzard of the Winter at ton, N. B.—Travel Blocked, Sk plows in Order, Steamers Delayed—Fiers Damaged.

MONCTON, N. B., April 9.—The blizzard of the winter and the biggest snow storm for a decade set in here this morning and still prevails. It is nearly a foot of snow on the ground lying badly.

AMHERST, N. S., April 9.—The first snow storm of the season commenced last night and continued till to-day streets and sidewalks are coney block.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 9.—The snow to-day is one of the heaviest. Snows are sent out to clear the tracks. Streets are delayed.

DIGBY, N. S., April 9.—A tremendous gale and snow storm prevailed here at night and continued with unabated to-day. Much damage has been done.

SOUTH HAVEN, Mich., April 9.—The small schooner Lottie Cooper was wed of Sheboygan, Wis., this morning, Ed Olson, one of her crew, was drowned.

MARINE DISASTERS.

Severe Gales and Snow Sns Cause Several Wrecks.

Serious Loss of Life—A Number of men Washed Overboard.

CHATHAM, Mass., April 9.—The bark Belmont, of Boston, Capt. Hogan, is sore on Pease Island and will be at loss. Six of the crew were washed overboard by the sea and were drowned. The Belmont was from Trinidad, Cuba, in a cargo of sugar.

LONDON, April 9.—A British steamer homeward bound from Iceland, ran the rocks off the coast of Grimsby, Lincolnshire, and six of her crew were drowned. The vessel is a total wreck. A dense fog prevailed.

HULL, Mass., April 9.—The three-masted schooner Mary A. Hood, Capt. F. V. Corson, from Philadelphia for Bath, Me., with a cargo of iron pipe, was wrecked off Nantasket Beach last night. The crew was rescued with great difficulty.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., April 9.—The schooner Nellie, of Thomaston, from Port Johnson for Salsbury, coal laden, went ashore last evening during a thick snow storm near Anniquam and is a total wreck. The weather was so thick that the life-savers were unable to locate the vessel. Soon after striking the vessel broke up and the crew were washed ashore. Capt. Averill and the cook were badly hurt.

A BRAVE YOUNGSTER.

Her Foot Caught in a Track—Presence of Mind Saves Her.

EAST TAWAS, Mich., April 10.—Olive Jones, 6-year-old daughter of Chas. Jones, residing at Prescott, while crossing the track of the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad at the road crossing at Prescott, caught her foot between the planking and rail. She saw the train coming, and her brother, a young man, running towards her to help her, but he did not arrive in time. The train did not slack down and her foot was injured, necessitating amputation just above the ankle after she was brought ashore. The remarkable presence of mind shown by so young a child is not often found. She said she saw she could not get her foot out before the train could get to her, and she did not want to have her head cut off or get cut in two, so she got her other foot off the track and leaned away over as to let the train cut off only one foot. After the first wheel passed over she got the foot part way out, and then said she pulled it clear out after the second wheel passed over, which was easy as the foot was literally a pulp. The child did not faint, and being young and healthy will get along nicely.

Great Lockout in Chicago.

CHICAGO, April 10.—The lockout has at last been ordered by the building trades for next Thursday morning. The committee's action in the matter is authoritative and final. The Painters' Union has unanimously determined that if the bosses declared a lockout that men affected by it would refuse to pay rent during the continuance of the lockout. They claim they will drag property owners into the fight. The lockout is expected to affect about 60,000 men.

Trouble in Alaska.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., April 10.—The steamer Topeka arrived yesterday from Alaska. The vessel brings news of the arrival of instructions to officials there to rigidly enforce the Edmunds Act as far as it relates to unlawful relations between white men and native women. As the law attempts to break up a long existing state of affairs trouble is likely to follow, and every arrest will be followed by a demand for a jury trial, which will surely result in acquittal.

MORE FUN THAN BUSINESS. The International Medical Congress in Rome does not seem to have done much for the vanishing of science. The Eternal City has been crowded to overflowing. The tele have been diving a roaring trade and tourists no doubt have done well, but it has been a great excuse party rather than a conference for exchange of new and great ideas. The doctors themselves were not over-satisfied with their reception, into which the new-making spirit of the Italian had largely entered. The great red rose that is worn by members of the congress did not always frank them past barriers, and thees demanded for seats at shows were often exorbitant. The King, however, did his best to be hospitable, setting a good example to royalty in other capitals. It was a colossal garden party at the Quai, which, although attended by a large mixture of people, was capitally d. Another official reception and illumination of the capital was not quite so successful except as a spectacle. Thousands of invitations were issued, though it was accommodation for barely 2,000, and the throng was so great that very few got into the museum. SIR JOHN CARLING'S REPLY

to the Letter From the Royal Templars to the French Treaty.

Sir John Carling, of Ottawa, has sent the following reply to Somerset Council, R. T. T., who asked him to oppose the French "Gentlemen,—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your communication of April 5 containing a resolution of Somerset Council of the Templars of Temperance, f London, regarding the ratification of the treaty of commerce with France. You will probably have observed that on March 27, previous to the passing and receipt of your resolution, the position of the Government in relation to the treaty in question was explained by the Prime Minister to a deputation of the friends of the temperance cause, and that at a subsequent meeting of the deputation they passed a resolution expressing satisfaction at the Prime Minister's assurance that the ratification of the treaty would not interfere with prohibitory legislation in case that were resolved upon.
