## Radically Different.

The U.S. Tariff Reported to the Senate.

An Entire Change From the Dingley Bill.

Duty on Wool and Hair Reduced Metal Schedule Very Low - Fish Free - Duty on All Coal 75c Per Ton - Cattle \$4 Per Head Instead of \$6.

Washington, May 5.- The tariff was reported to the Senate yesterday. All the members of the committee were present. The Democrats examined the bill for nearly an hour, making running comments upon it. They announced that they were against the oill as a whole. They soon understood that Senator Jones, of Nevada, was going to vote with the Republicans, and realized that there was no possi-bility of changing the bill. They had no desire to make any factious opposition, and when a motion was made by the Republicans to report the bill at nce it was carried. The new bill is radically different from the Dingley Bill, practically amounting almost to another measure. Many important schedules were rewritten entirely. The retroactive clause of the Dingley Bill has been stricken out. Among num-

erous other changes are the following:
Hides will pay 1½ cents per pound.
The duty upon all wools and hair of
the first class has been reduced from 11c to 8c per pound; second class, 12c to 9c; third class, 4c per pound duty, instad of 32 per cent ad valorem. The provision emphasizing that nothing in the bill shall be regarded as abrogating the Hawaiian treaty i stricken from the bill. This practically abrogates the treaty. This was done on the argument that what the United States gets in exchange for Pearl Harbor is the small amount of duties that will be collected on sugar, which is not

regarded as a fair exchange. A new paragraph is inserted, fixing until Jan. 1, 1900, a tax on beer, lager beer, ale, porter and similar fermented liquors of \$1 44 per barrel. After that date the tax is to be \$1 per barrel. The metal schedule is very low-far pelow the rate of the Dingley Bill, except on cutlery, in which the rates are proportionately high.

A very important new provision in the bill is that which admits fish free of duty. This provision is inserted as stimulus to the fishing industry of the great lakes. The changes in the agricultural


