Miss Lilian Lossing was married to Will T. Willis on Tuesday at the residence of E. A. Brown, Delatere street, Woodstock, by Rev. George Brown, of Hamilton.

Mr. J. H. Nunn, St. Thomas, sold, on Thursday, by auction, lot 12, in the 6th concession of Yarmouth, known as the Man Farm, containing 100 acres, to Mr. H. B. Parker, for \$4,500.

The funeral of Charles F. Guy, aged 24 years, son of T. F. Guy, of St. Thomas, who was killed by an electric car at Hamilton on Jubilee day, took place Wednesday afternoon at Woodhouse Cemetery.

F. H. Macpherson, of Windsor, has passed the examination of the Society of Chartered Accountants, and the degree of C. A. has been conferred on him. There are only 45 chartered accountants in Ontario.

Sarnia Observer: "Charles Roche has disposed of the Western Hotel to Peter Forbes, late of Wallaceburg and Port Lambton. The consideration was \$3,000. Mr. Forbes took possession of the premises Wednesday evening."

The Windsor Specialty Manufacturing Company (Limited), has been organized with a capital of \$10,000. Directors, Wm. McGregor, M.P., George Bartlett, James A. Smith, James Peddie, H. Finch, Miles Cowan and A. W. Joyce.

McCormick, one of the parties who was collecting money under false pretenses in St. Thomas a short time ago, was arrested by Detective Wescott, brought before Squire Lewis, and sentenced to fifteen days in Goderich jail.

Some person has been systematically poisoning dogs in Exeter of late. Last week two valuable hounds, one property of Mr. D. Johns and the other of Mr. R. J. Carling, were the victims. Several others had eaten the poison, but were noticed in time to save them.

Israel Smith has been appointed engineer of the Exeter fire brigade at salary of \$35 per annum. A franchise for the erection of poles and wires has been granted R. C. Tremaine, the purpose of putting in an electric light plant in the town.

A unique and valuable cup has been presented to the Exeter Croquet Club by George Anderson, to be played for by the members of the club. It is made of copper, bronze and silver-plated, and it is the handiwork of Mr. Anderson. It is composed of hoops, balls, mallets, etc., tastefully arranged, and is a handsome trophy withal.

A movement has been on foot for some time to establish another electric light plant in Exeter. Mr. R. C. Tremaine, of Toronto, has decided to put in a plant. He has purchased the old showrooms of the Verity Works, and will proceed with the equipment of the same. He has already secured contracts for supplying about 300 lights.

Rev. Arthur Murphy and a number of other enthusiasts are endeavoring to form a Gold Cure Club in Ingersoll. Mr. Murphy has been collecting subscriptions from citizens to send drunks with no means of support, to Gold Cure Institutes. The proposal is to organize a club and charge a membership fee of from \$5 to \$10. The club will have a reserve fund, and inebriates will be sent to the institute, aided with this fund, if they cannot pay their own way.

The bridesmaid was Miss Christina McTaggart, of St. Thomas; the maid of honor was Miss Minnie McLanders, and the groom was supported by his cousin, Dr. Galbraith, of Montrose, Mich.

There is trouble in store for members of No. 5 company, Essex Fusiliers, who refused to turn out to the War Memorial demonstration on Tuesday, and who also incited the men of No. 1 company to stay away. Among other things they paraded the streets of Windsor wearing badges, with the legend: "June 22, 1897. Mutineers. Twenty-first Essex Fusiliers. We never care to wander." It is said that one of the ringleaders in the "mutiny" has taken up his residence in Detroit till the storm blows over.

Some time ago Elgin Griffith, a well-known character, gave his little girl, who is now 4 years old, to Harvey Sofer, of Bayham, for adoption. The mother of the child has been in Arkansas, and now she wants the girl. An Heroic Captain.

Story of a Shipwreck on the Newfoundland Coast.

Six Men Missing and in All Probability Drowned.

Quebec, June 26.—The steamship Annapolis has arrived up with twelve shipwrecked men on board, the sole survivors of the crew of the bark Maynild, which was lost off Newfoundland on June 8.

The bark Maynild, of Christiana, (Capt. Tolefson), a wooden vessel of 1,401 tons, sailed from Philadelphia with a cargo of 1,800 tons of anthracite for this port. Up to the morning of the 21st she experienced fair weather, but on that day, when about 70 miles north of the Bird rocks, off Newfoundland, the encountered dense fog, and the vessel lay to. Soon afterwards a heavy wind from the southeast raised a big sea, and she rolled heavily. Being caught in the trough of the sea the cargo shifted, and the vessel turned over on her lee side, being thrown upon her beam ends. The water came half-way up to the deck, and as a last resort the masts were cut away, but their fall they crushed two of the boats, and also ripped up the deck.

The captain then ordered the long boat, which was the only sound boat left, to be launched. When the men were seated, the captain refused to embark, and remarked to the latter eye, who included the first mate: "The boat will swamp if we go on board, and we may as well die here as anywhere."

Seeing that the danger became every moment more imminent, the boat reluctantly pulled off, under command of the second mate. Ten minutes later the Maynild gave a heavy roll, and slowly disappeared. The first mate was seen by the boat's crew clinging to the large hatch, and an effort was made to reach him. The wind, however, was too heavy, and they drifted apart and soon were separated.

This occurred at 1 p.m. on Monday, and for 24 hours the boat tossed about at the mercy of the waves. Then the shipwrecked Annapolis sighted her and picked up the men. Although some of the crew hope that the mate may have survived, others are sure that he was swept off the boat.

The missing men, who it is morally certain are drowned, are: Captain Tolefson, First Mate H. A. Hanson, Steward Hans Wickner, Cook Wilhelm Jensen, Able Seaman Alex. Sjogren and Carl Carpenter.
