TUNNEL PICTURES

Experiment at Port Huron Was Very Successful.

Port Huron, Mich., Nov. 27.—The feat of taking biograph pictures of the 6t. Clair tunnel was successfully accomplished Saturday, an excellent negative being obtained. The first attempt proved a failure, owing to the breaking of a belt on the apparatus, but on the second effort everything went well.

The views of the exterior of the tunnel show a handsomely-appointed passenger train rushing up the incline in the Canadian approach, and a freight in the tunnel yards on this side about to descend the American approach. At the Canadian portal stood Joseph Hodgson, the designer and superintendent of construction of the tunnel, while at the American portal stood Mayor Herman W. Stevens, of this city.

A flash-light picture of the interior of the tunnel was also taken. The views are to form part of the Grand Trunk Railway system's exhibit at the Paris Exposition.

—Mrs. T. J. Cahill, of Elmwood avenue, South Weston, left yesterday for Brantford, where her sister, Mrs. (Dr.) Mott, lies dangerously ill.

—The provisional officers of the Seventh reported at the barracks at 9:45 o'clock this morning, to stand their examinations for certificates.

—Prince of Wales Lodge, No. 52, S. O. E., of Windsor, will receive an official visit from Supreme Grand President Dr. Hodgetts, Toronto, and S. P. G. P. A. L. Parnell, of London, this evening, after which a smoking concert will be given.

—William T. McAuliffe, a Bell Telephone lineman, of this city, had two ribs broken while working in Waterloo on Friday. He was helping to place a pole in position, when the spike-pole that he was using slipped and struck him. He was conveyed to his home here on Saturday.

—Thursday was the 68th birthday of Rev. Dr. Kilroy, of Stratford, and Bishop McEvay and Rev. Father McKee, chancellor of the diocese, with a large number of priests from surrounding towns and villages, were in attendance at the home of the worthy dean, who was congratulated upon celebrating another natal day.

—A frame barn owned by James McCoy, a retired farmer, living at 92 Wilson avenue, West London, was burned last night. The firemen were summoned, but could do nothing to save the structure. A water and a quantity of hay were destroyed. The loss will total about \$200. Cause of fire unknown.

—The second of the series of twilight organ recitals given by Mr. W. H. Hewlett in Dundas Center Methodist Church on Saturday afternoon was largely attended, and a splendid program of organ music was rendered. Mr. W. H. Skinner sang two solos most acceptably, the one with echo refrain by Miss Eva Roblyn being enthusiastically encored.

—The rendition of Gaul's celebrated cantata, "The Holy City," by the choir of Dundas Center Methodist Church, tomorrow evening, will doubtless attract all lovers of oratorio music. Mr. J. M. Sherlock, choirmaster of Carlton Street Methodist Church, Toronto, who will sing the tenor solo, has made a great reputation for himself as an oratorio singer. The contralto soloist will be Miss Reta Chute, of St. Thomas.

POSTOFFICE AT
NILESTOWN BURNED.

Together With Two Stores and a Stable—Fire Broke Out at Midnight Saturday—The Losses.

A disastrous fire occurred in the village of Nilestown, seven miles south-east of the city, between midnight Saturday and 2 o'clock Sunday morning. The blaze was discovered by a resident of the village, and the alarm given shortly before midnight. The postoffice and general store, occupied by H. W. Puckridge, and a store kept by Mr. Arthur Maule, together with a stable, were completely destroyed. The fire started in Maule's store, and the villagers turned out in force to fight the flames, but the blaze had gained great headway, and soon spread to the Puckridge store, the greater part of the stock from which had, however, been removed to a place of safety. Maule's store, a frame building owned by Mrs. Byers, and formerly occupied as a hotel, was destroyed with all the stock. The Puckridge store was owned by Mr. John Garvey, of this city. Maule's loss on stock, etc., will be \$700; insured for \$400. The building was also insured for \$400. The frame barn in the rear was also burned. Puckridge's loss will be light. Both stores were closed for the night shortly before the fire broke out, everything appearing safe then, and some of the villagers are inclined to think that the fire was of incendiary origin. Mr. Maule had only started business in Nilestown a few months ago, having gone there from Dorchester. When the fire broke out Mr. Maule was visiting friends at Dorchester Station.

THE CITY CHURCHES

Rev. M. C. Oakley Accepts the Call—Anniversary Services.

Anniversary services were held yesterday in St. George's Church, West London. The pulpit was occupied in the morning by Rev. C. C. Owen, of the Memorial Church. In the evening, Bishop Baldwin, assisted by Rev. Provost Watkins, Rev. Mr. English and Rev. Mr. Sage, conducted the services. Very large congregations were in attendance both in the morning and evening. The basis of Bishop Baldwin's sermon was in the words found in Psalms, cxviii., 22-23. The Bible was built on the most perfect and developed plan, and the center of this plan was Christ. It was divided into four main parts, the history of Israel, the history of the church of the living God, the history of the Gentile nations of the earth. The bishop closed his address by an urgent appeal to all those present to place themselves on the side of Christ Jesus, "the stone which the builders rejected," but which "is become the head of the corner."

ACCEPTED THE CALL.

Rev. E. C. Oakley, of Detroit, occupied the pulpit of the First Congregational Church yesterday. As it was known that he would give his reply to the call recently extended to him to become the pastor of the church, much interest was evinced, and the congregations were large, both in the morning and evening. He stated that after full consideration he had decided to accept the call to the pastorate, and felt that from the cordial unanimity of the call he would have the hearty cooperation of the congregation. He wanted every member to work in the church and to pray that God's blessing might build up the church and guide them in their work. Mr. Oakley said he would not be able to assume the pastorate immediately, but assured the congregation that he would do so as soon as possible.

In the Dundas Center Sunday school

yesterday afternoon, the classes devoted their time to a study of temperance. At the conclusion of the lessons, Mr. W. H. Liddicott, principal of the Talbot street school, delivered a short address upon that subject. He spoke simply, so that all the children present in close attention. Mr. Liddicott dealt with both the tobacco and the liquor habit. He believes that the best way to overcome them is to keep the young from ever starting them. If those at present enslaved by these habits had never indulged in their first cigar or drink they would not now be in their power. Bad habits should not only be avoided, but good ones should be cultivated. It is easier to tell boys and girls how to do things right than to show them by example how to do it. The young should be led in the right way by the effect of personal influence. Mr. Liddicott illustrated his talk by many apt anecdotes, and proved in many ways that he has the knack of maintaining children's interest.

The anniversary services of Forest Baptist Church yesterday were conducted by Rev. Thos. S. Johnson, of Adelaide Street Baptist Church. Rev. W. M. Walker, of South London, occupied the pulpit in the morning, and Rev. Mr. Parke, of Forest, conducted the evening service. The change in the announced arrangements was made to allow Rev. Mr. Walker to conduct the final services of the late H. Wall, who was a prominent worker in the South London church.
