

MUST TAKE DECLARATION

Scrutineers Must Announce Which Side They Are On.

An important innovation in the act governing the taking of the referendum vote is the fact that every scrutineer must make a declaration before the returning officer, or deputy returning officer, as to which issue he favors. He must declare that he wishes the question stated in the ballot to be answered in the affirmative or the negative, as the case may be. Until such declaration is made the returning officer must not, under penalty, issue the necessary certificate to the scrutineer. Heretofore, such declarations have been necessary only when a scrutineer wished to act in a different subdivision to that in which he voted.

Not Insane.

Present the Abuse.

Toronto, Nov. 18. - Provincial Secretary Hon. J. R. Stratton has drawn the attention of Attorney-General Gibson to an abuse which he thinks calis for special legislation or other remedy. He asks that physicians throughout the province be made to exercise greater care in giving certificates in connection with the sending of persons to the various asylums for the insane. There have been, he points out, within the past few months five cases in which, upon the certificate of physicians, persons have been sent to the asylums who were not insane, and who were, there was every reason to believe, sent there only to relieve their friends or the house of refuge, or some similar institution, naturally responsible for their care and maintenance. Of these patients it was pointed out that one suffered from a rheumatic affection and another from blindness.

Mr. Stratton suggests that some steps be taken to prevent physicians abusing their power in the manner mentioned and to punish those who willfully join with persons or officials of institutions to impose upon the provincial charity by giving certificates in the case of persons who are improper applicants for admission to the asylums. Mr. Stratton ordered the discharge of the five inmates referred to from the asylums, and their return to inches of the space necessary to build charge of the five inmates referred to the counties from which they came. a fence on his property.
