LIBRARY BOARD.

The public library board met last night to adopt reports. The library committee recommended the acceptance of the tender of the Red Star News Company, for supply of periodicals, adding "The Garden," "The Captain," and "Art Interchange," to the list.

The cards issued under number 10,577, 163 having been issued during October. The average circulation of books and magazines was 1,000.

Number of books sent out during the month being 7,425. Since the last meeting 43 volumes had been put on the shelves.

GAME IS PREVALENT.

Some idea of the prevalence of game and the increasing popularity of hunting in the province of New Brunswick, may be gathered from the fact that over \$14,000 has been collected by the surveyor-general, as the receipts from game licenses.

As the license fee to the residents is nominal, this means that New Brunswick is fast becoming a Mecca for American and upper province sportsmen.

The greater part of this money was paid for the privilege of shooting moose and caribou, and there is still another month before the season expires. The early snow in the northern woods has made the tracking of the animals easier, and the hunters are meeting with unprecedented success, particularly in the Concomi woods, within short distances of the line of the Intercolonial Railway.
