EXPERIMENTS WITH A GAS JET.

How the Flame May Be Made to Dance, Sing or Play Music.

With a Pinhole Burner You Can Provide Amusement For Yourself and Friends.

If you were to say that you could make common gas dance, talk, sing songs and play music, you might be laughed at, and yet the ordinary lighting gas can be made to do all these things. If you like, you can perform these and more tricks with gas, and you will need very simple apparatus. You require a pinhole burner. This

you can make yourself if you have a blow pipe, but if not you can get it made easily and at a small cost. To make it, get a piece of glass tubing and heat it in the flame, then draw out the heated part until you have a tube as small as a pin. Break it off at its smallest part and you have a pinhole burner.

Get a piece of rubber piping, which you must attach to an ordinary gas let, the other end to the thick end of the glass tube. When the gas is forced through and lighted it will burn in a long, thin flame.

If the room is quite free from draughts and all present are silent the flame will be steady, but if a watch is held near, it will wabble and flare back and forth, keeping axact time with the ticking of the watch. If you will call out in a loud voice it will leap to one tide as though you had frightenes it, and if you keep up a conversation in a loud voice it will dance about as though in excitement.

To make a gas jet speak, or to cause It to transmit sounds like a telephone, you must surround the pinhole burner with a tin tube having a small hole in one end, through which the burner pro-tests a little way. The bottom of the jects a little way. The bottom of the tin tube must be made to connect with a speaking tube, which may be in another room or on another floor.

Speak into the tube, no matter how far away from the gas burner, and the sound has to escape through the hole through which the burner projects and is, therefore, forced against the base of the gas flame, which is always more sensitive. The flame will take up the wave sounds and magnify them so that the words can be heard all over a very large room, and if you attach a dried. phonograph trumpet to the burner the sounds will be still more increased in strength and loudness.

To prove that it is really the gas that does the talking, turn off the gas and instantly the sounds cease, though the person at the other end of the speaking tube continues his conversation.

If you force the gas through a square of wire mesh, very fine and raised above the burner, by holding a lighted growth. plishes the same result. The root of the hair—the portion upon which growth depends—is stimulated by intimate contact with the brush, which should produce a sensation of pleasurable warmth in the scalp. A brush that scratches and irritates should be discarded.

The comb plays a minor part in hairdressing, but requires equal care in its selection. It should have widely spaced, comb cannot be approved at any time, as it subjects the large, strong hairs to pulling and injury by splitting or crack-

ing them, and may also tear the scalp. Too frequent drenching is apt to be harmful to the hair, since it is thus apt to be kept moist or damp. This state is favorable to decomposition here as elsewhere. It is sufficient in most cases to practice washing the hair not oftener than once a week. A good tol-let soap is to be used, the hair subsequently being rinsed well and carefully

When the hair has not sufficient oil of itself, some substitute may be provided, for which nothing serves better than vaseline or clive oil. This is to be applied to the scalp or to the roots of the hair. The brisk, daily brushing recommended above is also a stimulant to the oil glands.

RAISING OF FROGS A QUEER INDUSTRY

United States Will Consume All the Frogs Canada Can Preduce.

Frog farming as an industry is assuming large proportions in many parts of Canada, says the New York Sun. Not only are large shipments of frogs' legs made from this country to the United States, but there is a growing demand for the luxury in many of the

large centers of the Dominion. One of the most successful frog farms is in Ontario. Last year it produced 5,000 pounds of dressed frogs' legs and 7,000 living frogs for scientific purposes and for stocking other waters.

The deputy commissioner of fisheries for Ontario reports that in the past year a number of applications were made to the government for leases of lands suitable for this industry. It is safe to assume that in the very stocked with frogs. All that is necessary for this purpose is to place a few paired breeders in the water. Natural food is almost always present in sufficient amount for successful growth.

The species considered here to be most profitable, on account of its size, is the eastern bullfrog, Rana Catesbiana, which reaches a length of more than eight inches. It begins to breed at the end of three years, is very productive and reaches a marketable size in four or five years.

Only the hind legs are marketed, and they average half a pound a pair in weight. They are worth 50 cents a pound, at times, to the producer, and American dealers take as many as Canada can supply.
