Cheese—The holidays have interfered with business, and trading has been limited, but the outlook is better and there is more indication of improved inquiry, at least immediately. English cheese is now much scarcer, and firmly held at higher prices. New Zealand is selling better, particularly the coldest, mostly only one or two lots.

Butter—The market has been under a shortage in supplies, mostly only one or two lots. We report today's sales as follows: Finest Canadian, white and colored, 58c to 61c per cwt; fine Canadian, 58c to 61c per cwt; New Zealand, 58c to 61c per cwt; English cheese, according to quality, 62c to 78c per 120 lb. box.

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BIG DOCKYARD
FOR COLLINGWOOD

One Will Have a Length of Seven Hundred Feet.

Collingwood, Jan. 12.—A report which appeared in an evening paper to the effect that the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company had leased the Government dry dock at Kingston is neither confirmed nor denied by the authorities of the former company here. When seen they intimated that it is their intention to greatly enlarge the plant at Collingwood, and referred to the purchase of an additional waterfront of ten acres from the town by the almost unanimous consent of the electors at the recent elections as an indication of the magnitude of the proposed extensions. According to the directors of the company, the enlargement will include two new dry docks, one four hundred feet in length and the other seven hundred and five feet in length, with the necessary equipment. The first of these new dry docks is now under way, and it is expected, will be ready for operation early in the next season of navigation, when the other one will be immediately commenced. The object of the company in making the extensions is to take care of the constantly increasing business now being offered by the Canadian marine interests, which, it may be remarked, has increased from six or seven boats to upwards of one hundred within the past decade. The aid given the shipbuilding industry by the Dominion Government, enacting regulations imposing a duty of twenty-five per cent on repairs made on Canadian vessels in foreign countries has proved of great value to the shipbuilding industry here and in Canada. Steadily since its adoption the yards have been engaged in the repair work, and at the present time there are upwards of a score of steamers waiting to go into the dry dock. All of these will require more or less repairs, some very extensive jobs, and they will be practically sufficient to keep the yards going until the new extensions are completed. When the proposed extensions are completed these yards will have an equipment that is unsurpassed by any other on either side of the upper lakes. The keel is now being laid for the second new steamer for the Northern Navigation Company, while the fine new steamer Hamonic is being completed and will be ready to go on her route between Sarnia and Port Arthur in June next.

WALLACEBURG SKATERS
GET A DRENCHING

Three Boys Break Through the Ice—Death of a Pioneer.

Wallaceburg, Jan. 12.—A number of our town's boys were playing hockey on the ice yesterday afternoon when three of them, Randall Purser, John Hay and Ray Martin broke through into the river. They managed to pull themselves out, however, and hustled home. They were thoroughly drenched, but are apparently none the worse for their mishap and scare.

The death of Mrs. Hunt occurred on Saturday. She had reached the old age of 92 years. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from the residence of her son, Daniel Hunt. Service at the house was conducted by Rev. W. F. Roberts, and interment was made in Wallaceburg Cemetery.

WOODSTOCK'S LIBRARY

Carnegie Institution Formally Opened With a Reception.

Woodstock, Jan. 12.—After two years of building, Woodstock's new Carnegie Library was formally opened last night. A reception was held, at which a large number of citizens attended.

Among the outsiders visiting were Mr. Levitt, inspector of public libraries, and Rev. W. A. Bradley, of Berlin, president of the Ontario Library Association, both of whom gave brief addresses. William Munro, chairman of the local board, presided over a brief programme, in which Mayor Sawtell and other local speakers spoke. The building, which cost \$23,000, is of colonial architecture. It contains reading, smoking, board and reference rooms.

NOTHING IN THE STORY

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Denies Purchase of Winnipeg Tribune by C.P.R.

Montreal, Jan. 12.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy denies absolutely the purchase of the Winnipeg Tribune. The story was reported from the west last night. It was stated that the Tribune was being purchased by the C. P. R. management and published the A. P. service, which is refused by the other papers owing to excessive rates. The president of the C. P. R. says there is nothing in the story.

WINDSOR'S GROWTH.

Windsor, Jan. 12.—1908 was a year of unusual growth for Windsor. The total value of buildings erected which permits were issued was \$238,000, more than double that of the preceding year. The large increase is partly accounted for by the erection of two valuable business blocks in the downtown section, but there was a general boom in building. The entire list includes 126, as compared with 78 in 1907, and 90 in 1906.

Lively Fight for the Wardenship

Between Prominent Councillors

Meeting for Organization for the Year Will Be Held Shortly.

The county council will shortly meet for reorganization, and already a considerable interest is being shown in the contest for the wardenship. Several names have been mentioned in connection with the honor, among them being Mr. R. W. Jackson, second deputy reeve of London Township; Reeve S. R. Gillies, of Allis Craig; Reeve Kimball, of London Township; Reeve McFarland, of Nissouri, and others.

The personnel of the council will be as follows: West Williams—Reeve W. Ronald, Reeve R. Macdonald, Deputy G. W. Chittick.

Montreal, Jan. 12.—It was stated here today that Mackenzie & Mann have made an offer to the Government for the purchase of the Intercolonial Railroad, and that it has been favorably considered, with every prospect of going through. The purchase price is said to be \$40,000,000. To raise this sum Mackenzie & Mann will bond the road for \$20,000,000.

TURKISH SULTAN
HAPPIEST IN LAND

So Says New Ambassador of U.S. From Sublime Porte.

Washington, Jan. 12.—"Work, peace and progress," is the motto of the new Turkey, according to a message that Hussein Kiazim Bey, first Turkish ambassador to the United States and first envoy of a constitutional Ottoman Empire to the country, brings to America.

Enthusiasm over the changes which have given his country a constitutional form of government within the last year, the new ambassador, who arrived in Washington on Saturday, will endeavor to convince America that his nation has entered into a new era that will be permanent and make of his land one of the most prosperous on the face of the earth. Here early today, his mother, Mrs. Higgins, lost her life; his mother-in-law, Mrs. M. E. Corbin, was probably fatally hurt, and his wife, daughter Isabel, his young son and Mr. Higgins himself barely escaped death in the flames by jumping from a second-story window. It was as a result of this jump that Mrs. Corbin was fatally hurt.

His dress is that of a well groomed business man of this country, and as such his appearance contrasts remarkably with that of the Oriental ruler of former representatives of the Sultan of Turkey were usually attired when they appeared in public.</
