Algonquin National Park.

The Algonquin Park of Ontario is
fast becoming popular for anglers and
those fond of the wood and outdoor
life. The Grand Trunk Railway Sys-
tem have received a letter from a high
Government official of the state of
Connecticut, who has just returned
from a few days in the confines of
that delightful park. He says:

"Some weeks ago I sent for and ob-
tained a Grand Trunk folder relating
to Algonquin Park. The printed mat-
ter received was very interesting read-
ing, but I had the opportunity of
learning within a few days that the
beauties of the park were not over-
drawn, and that the fishing obtained
there was the best I have ever had
the privilege to enjoy, although I have
fished the trout waters of Prince Ed-
ward Islands, through the Canadian
Laurentian sections, and in Colorado
and Wyoming in the United States.

"I arrived at Algonquin Park from
Toronto on June 27, and on the 28th I
left the hotel for Smoke and Ragged
Lakes, arriving at Smoke Lake late
Sunday evening, June 28. I started
for Crown Lake the next morning,
and fished in that lake and had good
luck, catching square-tailed trout.
This lake is outside of the park. As
I started for my headquarters at the
park, June 30, on my return trip I
received very good advice, is now fishing
for salmon trout, using a deep water
trout and brown minnow for bait. Between
4 and 5 o'clock I caught two salmon
trout; one of them weighed eighteen
pounds, and measured thirty-two
inches in length.

"As my stay was only three days in
the park, I mean to know more about
this place, and shall try to go in there
again this fall. Descriptions of localities
and prospects of railroads are
often times disappointing. Many times
I think it is due to the fact that the
pictures are greatly overdrawn, but
from my own experience I should say
that your folder does not describe
this beautiful country, known as the
Algonquin Park, in as bright colors
as the facts warrant.

"Since my return I met a friend of
mine, United States Congressman Ed-
ward W. Higgins, of Norwich, Conn.,
who upon my advice, is now fishing
in the park in company with his wife.
He writes me that all that I told him
regarding the country is true, only that
I should have said more."

ONE MAN SLAIN,

25 SHOT IN RIOT

Italians and Slavs Fight Pitched
Battle at Pennsylvania
Coke Plant.

Unlontown, Pa., Aug. 3. — One man
dead and 25 others severely injured,
some of them fatally, are the results
of a riot early today between Italians
and Slavs at Gates, one of the H. C.
Frick Coke Company plants, near Ma-
sontown.

All the men are foreigners. There
have been factional differences be-
tween the two races for a long time.
Saturday was pay day at the large
plant, and until after midnight a large
quantity of intoxicants was consumed.
Jacob Furnace, leader of the Ital-
ian faction, went to the gate of a
Slav boarding house and defied its
25 inmates. Immediately Furnace and
Alexander Molawski, leader of the
Slavs, were engaged in a fight. An-
tillio Ronco, another Italian, went to
the assistance of the former, and this
was the signal for a general fight.
Revolvers began to crack and Ronco
fell dead, struck, it is said, by a mis-
directed shot fired by Furnace, to
whose assistance he had gone. The
injuries of the 25 men consist of bul-
let wounds through the body, arms
and legs. The most serious wounds
were received by the Italians.

A squad of the Pennsylvania State
constabulary were quickly at the
scene, and 19 of the rioters were ar-
rested and taken to Masontown. Mem-
bers of both factions then surrounded
the jail, demanding that their com-
panions be released. During the night
the jail was guarded, and today the
men were brought to Unlontown on a
special street car.

As the injured men recover they
will also be arrested.

THE MIKADO'S NAVY

Four Additional Battleships Planned
for the Jap Fleet.

Berlin, Aug. 3.—The Japanese will
take third place in the navies of the
world in 1911, according to the tabu-
lation made by the German Navy
League in its August leaflet, just out.
"Notwithstanding the assertions of
Japan's bad financial position," the
article says, "the so-called programme
of 1907 appears to provide for consid-
erably more construction than has
been reported. From an unusually
well-informed quarter it is affirmed
that Japan, besides building the three
battleships, Aki, A and B, and the
four armored cruisers, Kurama, Iouki,
and E and F, has apportioned money
for four additional battleships, each
of 20,800 tons, and for five armored
cruisers, each of 18,500 tons. Japan
has in actual service 14 battleships,
with a total of 191,400, and 12 large
cruisers, with a tonnage of 113,000.

TWO AT TORONTO

PERISH FROM CANOE

Toronto, Aug. 2.—Thomas Fitzgerald,
aid, a plasterer, was drowned in the
Humber this afternoon. He was in a
canoe and attempted to pass a pass-
ing launch when his canoe upset.

Percy Wall, a jeweller, whose home
is in Brantford, upset from a canoe
in the lake Saturday afternoon and
was drowned. Two others in the same
boat were saved.
