Toronto, Sept. 14.-With regard to the forest fires which have been devastating large sections of territory, it is understood that reports received at the department of lands, forests and mines show that practically little damage has been done to timber on crown lands. Millienaire Member of the Quebec The fires, in the neighborhood of the crown lands appear to be confined to the ground of a swampy nature, the burning undergrowth on which is productive of large quantities of smoke. Reports from New Ontario indicate that the fires there are assuming serious proportions. Towns are filled with


