## WEALTHY M. P. P. KILLED BY TRAIN

Millionaire Member of the Quebec Legislature Run Over at St. Gideon.

Quebec, Sept. 14.—M. Broet, a member of the Quebec Legislature for Lake St. John County, and formerly a prominent Belgian capitalist, was accidentally killed on the Quebec and Lake St. John railway last evening. He was returning to the city from Chicoutimi, where he had gone in the interest of his constituents, and on arrival at St. Gideon he stepped from the train to grasp the hand of a friend whom he saw on the platform, mistaking the distance, fell on to the rail, when the wheel completely severed his right leg close to the trunk. He was carried to the station, where every possible attention was rendered him and the best available medical men brought to his aid. He was operated upon, but all to no avail, for he passed away a few hours later.

The deceased gentleman was reported to be worth a million of money. He came to Canada about seven years ago, and purchased extensive lands in Northern Quebec, and headed several enterprises for the development of that section of the country. His philanthropy won the hearts of the poor of Lake St. John, and at the last Provincial elections he was returned to represent that county in the local legislature. He was an orator of convincing power, unmarried, and about 50 years of age.

An special train left Quebec this morning to bring the remains to this city, while friends here are in communication with relatives of deceased in Belgium. It is believed the remains will be taken to that country for interment.

Le Nationaliste predicts that the Dominion elections may be delayed till next year.

The steamer King Edward, which ran on a reef at Southampton, has been released.

The Sons of England conducted memorial services in Hamilton Cemetery Sunday.

George Sherman, of Windsor, fell from a gravel train near Kingsville and was killed.

The new power dam of Orillia's electric plant at Ragged Rapids, has been completed.

Henry Neville, aged 22, of Cavanville, was killed by jumping from a team at Millbrook.

Seven young men were arrested in a barn at Hamilton playing cards at 3:45 Sunday morning.

The western wheat crop will total 104,083,000 bushels, the agricultural department estimates.

Last year's western wheat crop totalled 70,053,444 bushels, having a cash value of \$55,053,444.

Over one million acres have been taken up in Alberta and Saskatchewan last month by homesteaders.

Archibald Macdonell, a farmer, aged 78, living near Carleton Place, was killed by his run away team.

The Penamerton Meadows and Northern Railway have filed at Howe Sound plans of their proposed route.

Hamilton street cars are now operated at 8 o'clock Sunday mornings, instead of 10 o'clock as formerly.

Harry Barnett, who said he came from Toronto, was sentenced at Owen Sound to one year for burglary.

The south shore of Lake Superior is clouded with the smoke of forest fires and navigation is impeded.

W. George Elliott, of Brantford, manager of the Ontario Portland Cement Company, is dead of paralysis.

Mrs. Henrietta Galloway, of Halifax, was burned to death by a lighted match which set fire to her dress.

Antoine Lockmeyer, a Prussian settler at Canora, Man., has fallen heir to a large estate in the fatherland.

The cornerstone of the new Ryerson Methodist Church, Hamilton, will be laid next Saturday by Cyrus A. Birge.

Six arrests have been made at Cranbrook after an attempt to blow the safe of the Fink Mercantile Company.

Allen Stanley and Michael McHugh were arrested at Belleville on a charge of breaking into a G. T. R. bonded car.

Norman Boyd, while out with the Hamilton Riding Club, was thrown from his horse, sustaining a broken hip.

The infant child of Mrs. Lascelles, of Winnipeg, was accidentally smothered while sleeping with its mother.

John Begg, of Hamilton, aged 35, died after eating heartily of plums, the fruit fermenting, causing pressure on the heart.

Frank Heny, aged 17, of New Westminster, was killed by the accidental discharge of his gun while hunting near Agassiz.

The arrest of J. H. Jacob, president of the City Ball League of Hamilton, is asked on the charge that he is short in his accounts.

## FIGHTING FIRES DAY AND NIGHT

Northern Ontario Settlers Menaced by the Widespread Bush Fires.

Toronto, Sept. 14.—With regard to the forest fires which have been devastating large sections of territory, it is understood that reports received at the department of lands, forests and mines show that practically little damage has been done to timber on crown lands. The fires in the neighborhood of the crown lands appear to be confined to the ground of a swampy nature, the burning undergrowth on which is productive of large quantities of smoke.

Reports from New Ontario indicate that the fires there are assuming serious proportions. Towns are filled with smoke by day and blazing fires at night betoken serious menace to settlers and new communities, unless heavy rain comes soon. Fire-fighters have been busy all week trying to save the summer cottages of North Bay citizens on the lake shore from destruction, and safety is not assured.

Along the T. and N. O. fires are raging, and many settlers are being wiped out. Between North Bay and Sudbury forests are blazing fiercely, and settlers are in danger. No rain has fallen for weeks and the country is as dry as tinder. Heavy and continued rains alone can save the situation.

Port William is still in danger, but the inhabitants believe they can keep the flames off.

Pembroke, Sept. 14.—Forest fires are sweeping around the entire district north and west of the town, and while they have as yet not come within actual close proximity to the immediate neighborhood, the smoke is very dense. Up in the neighborhood of Chalk River and Des Joachims the fires are feared to be approaching the settlements.

Parry Sound, Sept. 14.—Extensive bush fires are raging all through this district, extending from the Severn River to Sudbury, and great damage is being done to standing timber, even the hardwood bushes being affected in consequence of the prolonged drought.

The air is filled with smoke, rendering navigation of the Georgian Bay extremely difficult. All through the district the settlers are fighting fires almost day and night and unless rain comes soon the loss to lumbermen and settlers will be enormous.

In the neighborhood of Waboumaic and at other points along the line of the C. N. O. R. and C. P. R. the reflection of the fires are so bright at night as to almost allow one to read.
