STRONG PLEAS FOR MISSIONS

People of Christendom Should Help Those of Heathendom.

LONDON CONFERENCE

Heard Eloquent Speakers Tell of the Needs in Many Fields.

The need of the mission field and the way the Methodist Church was meeting this need, was the underlying subject of the four addresses delivered at the missionary conference in connection with the London Conference meeting in the Askin Street Church last night.

Mr. C. E. German was the first speaker of the evening. "The ideal of everyday life," said Mr. German, "is service." "There are people who say, 'We have spent much money in the foreign fields, now let us spend it at home.' Is this right? Does it not savor of self-seeking? The Copernican system used to teach that the earth was the centre of the universe, and all the planets revolved around it, and is there not sometimes a Copernican system in our lives, that we are the centre, and all the world's interests hinge around our little sphere of interest? Is it the best sportsman who plays the game only when it is for his own glory? No! Even in the baseball field the ideal is an ideal of service. Some people think that money-making is the great thing. But one man in a hundred knows the name of the man who a short time ago cornered the wheat market and turned over several millions of dollars. While everyone knows the name of the young man operator of the Republic.

The Artesian Wells. "There is a gentleman of this city who is giving of his time and money to supply the city with pure water, and everyone respects him for the sacrifice he is making for this project. The ideal of all life is service. Why do we adore the Lord Jesus Christ? Not because he is the Lord, but because he forgot that fact, and came to suffer and die and serve that we might live.

"This is the ideal, and the motive power behind this ideal is love. Christ died to save the world, and the love of Christ in our hearts prompts us to service. And these are the two forces that are at the back of the Layman's Missionary Movement. And if less time were spent on the problems of criticism and more on the holding up of Christ, then the personal love of Christ would lead us by a stronger love and a more unselfish service to the end that we so much desire.

Mrs. Gordon Wright, the president of the London Conference branch of the Layman's Missionary Society, spoke of the work of that society.

"It is but fitting that at this service you should hear something of our society," she said. "It is a wonderful story, the record of its 28 years of existence. And we hope there will be a sympathy born in you for the work of the women of Christendom, for the women of heathendom. At first the work was unrecognized. But no opposition could stop its course, for it was born of God. It was the story of the far east, told before a little gathering of women in Old London, that stirred them to action and led them to realize the sisterhood of all nations. And in that hour there was born the first woman's missionary society.

"In Boston in 1880 nine women banded themselves together to follow the work of their sisters in the far east, and now sixty boards have arisen out of this small beginning. In 1881 our own society was formed in the city of Hamilton. For 28 years we have been working for the world. This year the society raised \$2,916, which was thought a huge sum, and we increased our gifts till last year we were able to give \$7,802.

"From every mission field of Japan, where our first mission was established by Miss Cortez, we have heard nothing but encouraging words. But every year brings greater demands. It is one of the greatest opportunities the church has ever had, and we want not only to hold our own in these mission fields, but to be able to increase our activities.

"If our society had done nothing but the work in Japan, it has demonstrated its right to live.

"I need no more than allude to the work in China, for you are to hear tonight from one who comes direct to us for ten new workers for China the next four years, and this means even greater efforts. Then there is the work among the Indians, and in the Lower Provinces, and out latest field in our own Northwest. This work, too, is the hour of our opportunity. If we would hold Canada for Christ, and if we do seem now that we should go up and possess the land if only for patriotic reasons.

The London Conference. "In the London Conference there are 470 preaching places, and we have only 150 societies, and some 20 mission circles, and there is a great opening for us. I appeal to you for workers for aid. You may say that you have now all the burdens you can bear, but remember the words of Robert E. Speer. 'The greatest asset any church can have is difficulty, and we hope you will assist us. And we feel we have a right to come to you for aid, for an added sympathy and support, because of the assistance our society has been to the laymen's missionary movement. This work, I commend to you without fear, for I know you will do your utmost to further the work.'

cational and the moral and religious needs of the people, but tonight I have out to come in touch with a foreign nation, and so we know that if we send these men we will have our influence in shaping the great nation into the image of the Prince of Peace."

Mr. Rowell.

The president, Rev. A. K. Birks, introduced Mr. N. W. Rowell, K.C., of Toronto, by saying: "It is rare that a brother and sister speak on the same platform as this evening."

When Mr. Rowell and Mr. N. W. Rowell both would speak for the cause of missions. "We are witnessing in Canada a very unique spectacle," said Mr. Rowell. "We find all the churches united under one banner. If we started in to find a basis of creed, on which all could agree, we would meet with almost insurmountable difficulties. But when a committee came together in Toronto to formulate a principle whereby all the churches could work together for missions, there was very little difficulty in attaining a harmonious understanding, and it is this basis of union in the great missionary work that I come to present to you tonight. I'm sure the statement of policy of this Laymen's Movement, finds a hearty sympathy in the lives of all, and if we can but behind it all the membership of the churches to give the policy effect we have the strongest evidence of the power of Jesus Christ. When we face the tremendous problems and opportunities in our own land and the Far East, surely we should sink the minor differences and go forward on the great fundamental principles to conquer the world for Christ."

"What was the great secret of the success of Methodism in the early church? It is that she has gripped the power and enthusiasm of the laymen. This is still a dominant factor, but it is lying out in Canada, and this Laymen's Movement came to bring this principle again into being.

"I covet for our Methodism that such an enthusiasm in the work that our laymen shall go from place to place to enthuse their brother laymen everywhere. In this conference you average \$1.40 per communicant member, and we wish to increase this giving by one-third. But this is not the main thing. We want to get men. You can get men to assist in an election campaign, who will work year in and year out for these causes. But if men will do this for their country have we not a right to expect that the very strongest men will give of their time to the cause of Christ?"

"We have been asleep as laymen. We haven't been awake to our privileges and responsibilities. How can you laymen interest your time and ability and energy better than in putting your heart and soul into the work for the redemption of humanity?"

Laymen Handicapped. "The laymen of the church are tremendously handicapped to be Christ-like in their work, unless the minister is a leader. Unless he believes with all the heart and soul that there is nothing but the gospel to meet the needs of men. The minister must lead. And with this leadership and the co-operation of the laymen, I believe the London conference will be the banner conference for the leading in this great work of bringing humanity to the service of Jesus Christ."

During the evening the Rev. Walter Milson sang, and the ministerial choir also aided in the service.
