HIS BODY BURIED

Dead Duke's Remains to Rest in Windsor Vaults for the Present.

Windsor, Feb. 28.—The body of the late Duke of Fife, who died at Assuan, Egypt, on Jan. 28, from pleurisy and congestion of the lungs, resulting from exposure during the wreck of the liner Delhi off the Moroccan coast Dec. 13, when he and the princess royal and their daughter narrowly escaped with their lives, was temporarily buried today in the royal vaults here. It will remain here until the completion of the family vault at Mar Lodge, Broomhall, Scotland.

The funeral service was of the simplest kind. King George, Queen Mary

and the princess royal and her daughters, some other members of the royal family, and a few personal friends, composed the congregation. Queen Mother Alexandra was unable to be present, owing to an attack of influenza.

HIT AN AIRHOLE.

San Bernardino, Cal., Feb. 28.—Aviator Harvey Crawford, of Los Angeles, fell 200 feet yesterday, but escaped with a few scratches when his airplane became unmanageable. His engine went dead while he was 1,200 feet in the air, and the aviator began to plummet to earth. About 200 feet from the ground "air holes" were encountered, and the airplane was dashed to the ground.

LOCAL DENTISTS FORM A DENTAL SOCIETY

Membership Will Include All Those in Middlesex Who Are Willing to Join.

Through the efforts of Dr. Ross Thomas, the dentists of London on Tuesday night for the purpose of forming a Dental Society. A fair number were present, and all were very enthusiastic. The subject of an association was introduced, and after considerable discussion it was decided to form a society, to include all dentists desiring to join in the County of Middlesex, as well as those of the city of London. The society will be known as the Middlesex Dental Society. An executive was elected, fees decided upon, and other business transacted.

The chief aim of the society will be to educate the public along dental lines, and to further the interests of dentistry generally. It will also be instrumental in instructing its members. Original papers will be read at their meetings, and clinics on dental operations given by prominent men in the profession, both of Canada and the United States, and banquets from time to time in the way of amusement.

Hydro Bills.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

Having read with interest the letter which appeared in your paper of last day, I thought a few facts from the East End would not be out of place. I notice one of the statements made is that some people claim that their bills are higher than ever before, and I find this to be the fact out here. One merchant here made the statement that with the London Electric under the old rate his largest bill was not more than \$4 for any one month, but under the hydro, with the new rate, and no more lamps, his bill for January was nearly \$8, so he immediately changed back to the old company. Again, the proprietor of one of our hotels made the statement that under the old rate his largest bill for lights and a small motor was \$7 less than his hydro bill for January for lighting alone, the motor not being operated by hydro. Personally I did not use electric light under the old system, so I cannot compare my own hydro bills with any other, but I am satisfied that they are high enough and would like

to know if none of our high-salaried engineers cannot find out the cause of these discrepancies, or will it be necessary to call in a good man to tell them what to do?

We have been told repeatedly what an efficient general manager we have. Let me illustrate this by an experience of my own: One month my meter reading was overlooked, and consequently my following bill was for two months. I naturally expected to get the usual discount, but when I went to pay the bill they refused it for the month they did not read the meter. Possibly the discounts are needed to pay the increased salaries of the meter men.

That is the danger point in democracy, and we should look to it before it is too late.

It has been proved over and over again beyond all question that the treacherous habit that is destroying us, and it is simply demoralization, we permit it to continue, especially in places that have no other means of livelihood. The respectable hotel can not afford to make drunkards, and if the proprietor did so, he should be deprived of his license, no matter how large his house. People who have no other means of livelihood are awakening to the folly and madness of it, and we must not lag behind.

QUEBEC BRIDGE CLASH

NOT McNAMARAS' WORK

Reported In Philadelphia That the Structure Had Been Dynamited.

[Canadian Press.]

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 28.—Officials of the Phoenix Bridge Company, which had charge of the construction of the Quebec bridge when it fell into the St. Lawrence River in August, 1907, causing the deaths of 64 persons, do not credit reports from Canada that the McNamaras were responsible for that catastrophe. Representatives of the Burns Detective Agency also denied that they had sent detectives to investigate the Quebec disaster.

The theory accepted by the bridge company is that the catastrophe was caused by some faulty material put into the bridge construction, which was planned to have the longest cantilever span then existing.

New York, Feb. 28.—In a letter issued today, addressed "To whom it may concern," the district council of House-smiths and Bridgemen of New York and vicinity asserted that the "accusations against our organization in reference to the Quebec bridge disaster are absolutely unfounded, inasmuch as the job going on at that time was wholly a union job."

The letter is over the name of Charles Wm. Ludwig, secretary of the organization, and adds that so far as learned all the men employed as ironworkers who lost their lives in the accident were union men.

"After the disaster," it reads, "our international association levied a \$1 assessment on the entire association membership, and paid all death claims of those who were known to be lost on the bridge."

GAYNOR'S WORDS

COST HIM \$10,000

New York Mayor Has to Pay Large Sum to End Libel Suit.

New York, Feb. 28.—It took more than a letter of apology to settle the libel suit of Gen. Theodore Bingham against Mayor Gaynor, which was discontinued when, Feb. 16, the mayor wrote to the attorney general, commissioner of the city, that the strong words used in his letter to Mayor McClellan concerning the arrest of the boy on which the suit for \$100,000 was based, should not have been applied to Gen. Bingham.

There were expenses incident to the suit, for court costs, witness fees and such matters. Larger than these was the fee paid to Gen. Bingham's lawyer, the total costs being in round numbers \$10,000. Mayor Gaynor paid these costs, and it was this condition that Gen. Bingham dropped further prosecution of the suit.

THE CAMORRIST TRIAL

Crown Prosecutor Says Erricone Was Master Mind of Organization.

Viterbo, Italy, Feb. 28.—The crown prosecutor, Signor Santoro, who began his summing up in the proceedings against the Camorraists several days ago, has not yet concluded his address. He has gone into the minutest details of the case in an effort to demonstrate that all of the accused were members of the criminal organization known as the Camorra, and were therefore equally guilty. He declared that Luigi Fucile was only the nominal head of the Camorra, the master mind being "Erricone," and he strongly stigmatized the action of certain of the authorities, including the police officials, who, he asserted, instead of helping justice,

SOFT COAL MINERS TO HOLD MEETING

Agreement With the Operators Expires on Last Day of March.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Feb. 28.—After conferring with members of the anthracite mine workers' committee, which has presented demands for a new working agreement to the hard coal operators, John P. White, president of the United Mine Workers of America, planned to leave tonight for Chicago, where he will call a conference of bituminous leaders to consider the situation in the soft coal regions. As in the case in the anthracite districts, the agreement between the miners and their employers in the bituminous regions expires on March 31. Mr. White was in a cheerful humor today, though he admitted he would not be surprised if the demands on the anthracite operators would be turned down. Some of the operators, it is reported, favor granting an increase in wages of 5 per cent, but according to no other demands.

The general belief here is that the negotiations for a settlement will continue for a long period of time.

President White said the union in the anthracite district is well organized, and that there is a large paying membership.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE ROYAL VISIT

Manufacturers' Committee Will Take Matter Up Shortly.

There will be no meeting of the city hall committee this week, nor is it likely that the manufacturers' committee will be called.

The latter body will get together shortly, however, as there are many matters of importance to be discussed. Among them is the appointment of a commissioner of industries, and making arrangements for the entertainment of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, the entertainment of the Orange Lodge, which meets in London in March, a reception to the National Council of Women, the convention of the Order of the Moose, together with scores of minor matters.

"We will get together some of these days," said Ald. Spittal, the chairman. "It will be some days yet, but we have so much business to do that we should get busy as soon as possible."

FRESH EGG GLUT ON NEW YORK MARKET

Up-State Farmers Demoralize Plans of Merchants to Keep Prices Up.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Feb. 28.—Up-state farmers who read on Sunday of the high prices of fresh eggs in New York have demoralized the market by shipping thousands of cases to commission merchants in this city. Heretofore these shipments have been made by freight, but in this instance the farmers, anxious to sell at the top of the market, sent millions of eggs by express. The prices dropped from 45 cents to 29½ cents, wholesale, within 48 hours, and even at the lower figure the present supply is far ahead of the demand.

The result is that for the first time during the winter fresh eggs are a glut on the market. The commission merchants, unwilling to send the eggs back for fear of offending the farmers, predict a still further decline in prices.
