

"BILL" HAYWOOD IN FIST FIGHT AT AMERICAN LABOR FEDERATION

Chased Into Street and Has To Be Rescued by the Police.

Rochester, Nov. 24.—A fistie encounter between Wm. D. Haywood, a leader in the Industrial Workers of the World, and J. Mahlon Barnes, who was national campaign manager of the recent Socialist campaign, took place last night in the lobby of Convention Hall, while the American Federation of Labor was holding its final session. Haywood and Barnes met just outside a door to the auditorium. The door was opening, and President Gompers, on the platform, saw Haywood strike Barnes.

"A delegate to this convention has been insulted by 'Big Bill' Haywood," shouted Gompers. "Delegates will keep their seats and the sergeant-at-arms will remove the disturber."

THIRTY THOUSAND ENGINEERS TO GET AN INCREASED WAGE

Their Long Fight Against the Eastern Railroads Decided in Their Favor.

Washington, Nov. 24.—The thirty thousand locomotive engineers of the eastern railroads have won their fight for an increase in wages. The board of arbitration between the railroads and the engineers in its award made public today does not grant all of the engineers' demands, but establishes minimum wages, which amount to a substantial increase on most of the roads.

Notwithstanding the increase in compensation, the report of the engineers on the board dissents from the award, and says the settlement accepted by it can be only temporary. The award is retroactive, running for only one year from May 1, 1912. This means that within five months thereat.

TWO FORMER PASTORS SPOKE IN CHURCH

Educational Sunday in the First Methodist Church Proved Unique.

Educational Sunday was observed in the First Methodist Church when two former divines of the local church, Rev. John W. Graham, D.D., and Rev. Geo. Daniel, Ph.D., preached to large congregations.

Dr. Graham gave a resume of the progress of the Methodist Church, and stated that since "progress" was the word of the age, and to keep up with the advance of Canadian growth, it was essential to provide a more thorough religious training to cope with the situation. The foreign colonies which are being established in such large quantities in the West was another factor, which, if it was to be met with successfully, also demanded training.

To show the progress of the Methodist Church in the prairie provinces, Dr. Daniel stated that they were now 30 more ministers in the field in Saskatchewan and Alberta than the whole Canadian Methodist Church could claim 25 years ago. In 1907 the minimum amount of money lent to students was \$10,000, but this grant under a new system amounted to \$18,000. The students, who were located in the West, were a fine set of young men and a credit to the church.

Dr. Daniel thought that there were many members in the congregation who were not giving the church as their means warranted them to do. Their incomes had been materially increased, but the church was not receiving its proper share of the increase.

The speaker also paid a high tribute to the ability of the large choir, and said it was second to none in the country.

"BE PREPARED," SAID REV. FATHER O'CONNOR

Death Will Come to All Alike and No One Knows When.

Rev. Father O'Connor, one of the professors in the Roman Catholic Seminary of London, preached to the children at the 9 o'clock mass on Sunday in St. Mary's Church, East London.

"There are some things in this life which you may avoid," he told the little ones; "but the one thing you are certain of is death. This is why the Catholic Church begins her year, namely the first Sunday of Advent, with the reading of the gospel of the general judgment, and ends her year, which occurs on the last Sunday after Pentecost, with the reading of the same gospel. Her reason is plain. First and last she wishes to remind you one and all, that death must come to all, and that to be saved means to be prepared. No man or person can save another. You cannot save me. I cannot save you. We must save ourselves. Be prepared, for you know not the day nor the hour."

LARGE CROWD AT THE SUNDAY CONCERT

The Sunday concert given last evening in the Majestic Theatre was well attended in spite of the rather unfavorable weather. There was not a vacant seat in the place. 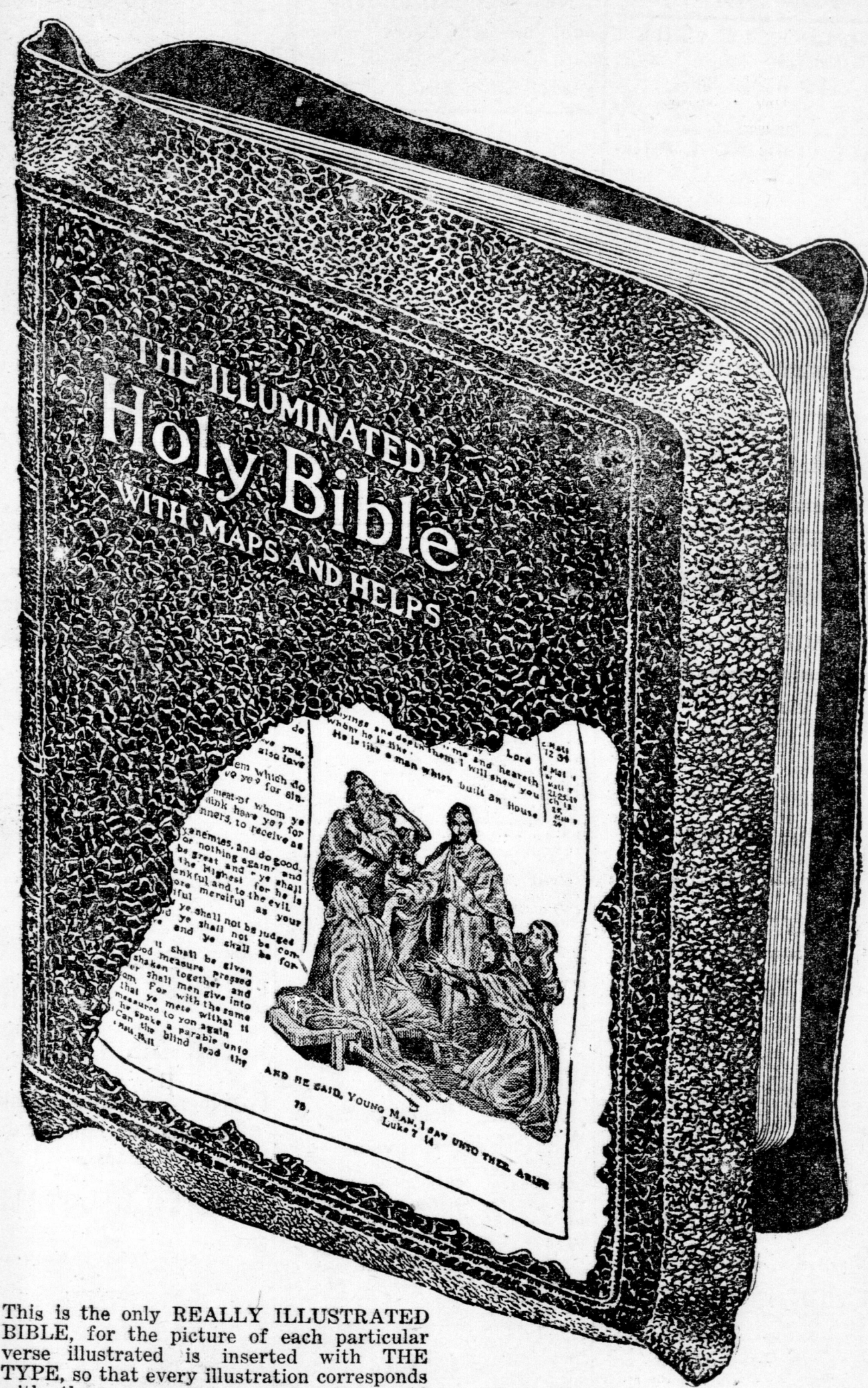
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BROKEN COLLARBONE.
