### NO ASSURANCES FOR FUTURE MAY BE ASKED BY OFFICERS

And Superiors May Not Inquire Into Subordinates' Hypo-thetical Attitude—New Army Order Issued—Cabinet Wants French and Ewart to Remain.

[Canadian Press.] Gen. Sir John S. Ewart have not yet been withdrawn, and Premier Asquith, after deferring his statement twice, was able only to announce in the House of Comnons this afternoon that the Government was still awaiting the reply of the army officers to the cabinet's request that they

emain at their posts. Premier Asquith reached the House of net meeting held today, both of which were attended by the chief of the general staff, Field Marshal Sir John French. The Premier said matters in the question involved great complexity and difficulty and seemed to the Government to require very full consideration. A partial or provisional statement would be unsatisfactory.

No Difference of Views. Sir oJhn French and Lieutenant-General Sir John S. Ewart, the adjutantgeneral of the forces, had intimated a wish to be relieved of their offices, Mr. Asquith said, not because of differences being their views and those of the Government as to the conditions under which to be repeated. the army should serve or should be emearrying out of which the Government made.' would regard as a serious misfortune to both the army and the state. These two gallant officers believe that in the circumstances they were justified in believing their action was in accordance with the instructions of the cabinet, and that they were transmitting those directions to the officers concerned. Dealers Say Old Time-Eat-as-Many-Eggs-as-You-Can Can Be Economically Observed.

Londoners may be able to indulge in the old-time eating-as-many-eggs-asyou-can contest this Easter, for eggs are cheaper now than they have been for many years, according to happy buyers the dealers, they are likely to continue cheap right through Easter week, and for some time later, as most prices are high and yet have not affected the price of eggs.

17 Cents Wholesale Price. Eggs are selling, on the market square for 21 cents a dozen retail, and were bought yesterday morning for 20 cents retail and 17 cents and 18 cents wholesale. Almost every farmer on the square was selling eggs. Most of the buying was done by wholesalers.

Middlesex hens are making a record, and eggs in London are cheaper than in any other city in this part of the country. One country grocer who collects eggs from the farmers in his vicinity sold 00 dozen to a local wholesaler yesterday afternoon. Several other big lots were

Imported Eggs Responsible. The main cause of the reduction, according to dealers, is "e importation of eggs from the Southern States, where the hens lay much earlier than here, and where poultry men make a business of producing eggs in large quantities for the early season. The Canadian West is also

hipping eggs in quantities here. Dealers see no reason why the reduced rices may not continue for some time. Large quantities of eggs are expected or the market square tomorrow
