

RULE NO. 1-Any woman, either married or single, over 15 years of age, may become a candidate. It is not necessary to be a subscriber to The London Advertiser in order to enter the

RULE NO. 2-The voting will be by means of ballots clipped from The London Advertiser and by special subscription coupons, issued on all new subscriptions, renewals and paid in advance.

RULE NO. 3-Votes once credited to any candidate cannot be transferred to any other candidate in the race, with the exception, that a candidate who enters and for any reason has to withdraw, may change her votes to a suitable substitute, but said substitute cannot be any candidate whose nomination had been before accepted in the race. The substitute must be an entirely

RULE NO. 4-Votes cannot be bought under any circumstances. They must either be clipped in the form of the daily ballot or issued on subscription payments.

RULE NO. 5-The first nomination received will count for five thousand votes for any candidate, but only one nomination

can count for any one candidate. RULE NO. 6-No employee of The London Advertiser can

RULE NO. 7-The final count at the close of the contest will be made by a competent board of judges.

RULE NO. 8-The London Advertiser reserves the right to accept or reject any nomination without giving an explanation other than that the nomination is not acceptable.

RULE NO. 9-The London Advertiser reserves the right to make any and all rulings which may be necessary for the best interests of the candidates.

RULE NO. 10-The London Advertiser will decide all questions which may arise in the course of the campaign, and the candidates on entering agree to abide by such decisions, which shall

RULE NO. 11—The contest will close on Tuesday, May 25, at 4 p.m., and the candidate in each district having the highest number of votes will be declared the winner. All subscriptions must be in by this hour and date.

RULE NO. 12-There will be four districts, as follows: District No. 1-All that territory inside the city limits, north

of, and including both sides of Dundas street, and west of, and including both sides of Wellington street. District No. 2-All that territory inside the city limits, east of, but not including, Wellington street, and north of, and includ-

ing both sides of Dundas street. District No. 3-All that territory inside the city limits, south of, but not including, Dundas street, and east of, but not including,

District No. 4-All that territory inside the city limits, west of, and including both sides of Wellington street, and south of, but not including Dundas street.

Candidates will not compete against each other, except that candidates have the right to secure votes or subscriptions anywhere they please, and the votes will count in accordance with the vote value of that district.

RULE NO. 13-A daily ballot will be published, good for ten votes each, from the first day that a ballot appears until seven days before the close of the contest, when no more daily ballots will be published. Each daily ballot will have upon it a ten-day expiry limit, and these ballots must be in the office of The London Advertiser before said expiry date in order to be counted for any can-

RULE NO. 14-Nominations of candidates may be made by anyone at any time without cost. Any candidate wishing to have her name withdrawn from the list must write to The London Advertiser, or call personally at the office.

RULE NO. 15-No statement or promise made by any person whatever varying from the above rules will be recognized by The London Advertiser.

RULE NO. 16-The contest will officially start on Saturday, March 27, 1915, and end Tuesday, May 25, 1915, at 4 p.m.
