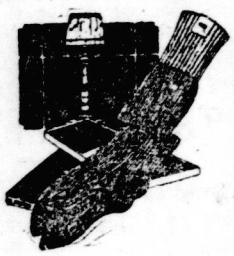

WHITE SOX PLAYERS TESTIFY AT FORMER TEAMMATES' TRIAL

Statements Tend To Disprove State's Evidence.

JURY MAY HAVE CASE THIS WEEK OR FIRST PART OF NEXT WEEK.

CHICAGO, July 28.—The defense in the baseball trial rested its case tonight.
