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FREE STATERS AGREE TO OATH OF ALLEGIANCE

Form of Oath Is Incorporated Into New Irish Constitution Tuesday.

INTRODUCED BY O'HIGGINS

Amendments Proposed by Gavin O'Duffy Turned Over by Assembly.

DUBLIN, Oct. 3.—The Irish government has issued a proclamation offering full amnesty to all offenders who surrender their arms by October 15.

DUBLIN, Oct. 3.—The Parliament today passed, by a large majority, the clause of the new Irish constitution containing the oath of allegiance.

In moving the article of the treaty containing the form of the oath, Kevin O'Higgins, minister of home affairs, said it was not a particularly pleasant task to recommend that particular article to the Irish assembly, but as they believed the tampering with this and other similar articles would mean throwing away of the harvest of the present struggle, they were not prepared to allow that harvest to rot in the field.

Mr. O'Higgins said he could not admit the suggestions appearing in the press, which stated that the oath was optional. He declared that such a position was opposed to common sense. No British or Irish signatory would admit that the oath which gave so much trouble and tension in the last stage of the negotiations was not to be taken by all members of Parliament precedent to taking their seats in the Dail, he asserted.

Gavin O'Duffy, former foreign minister, moved an amendment modifying the oath in such a manner as, its sponsors claimed, would not give the anti-treaty partisans and laborites into direction against the treaty. An amendment from the labor group sought to add a further paragraph in which the swearer would undertake to act in matters concerning the Free State only on advice of the executive. Both amendments were defeated.

Mr. O'Higgins, supporting the government's position, pointed out that the Republicans who sat at Westminster took a full oath of allegiance, as did Republicans in the Parliament of South Africa and every other country. "Clause 17, which contained the oath, was then voted and agreed upon with out division."

Article XVII of the new constitution, which contains the oath, reads: "The oath to be taken by members of Parliament (Oireachtas) shall be in the following form: "I do solemnly swear true faith and allegiance to the constitution of the Irish Free State as by law established, and that I will be faithful to His Majesty King George V., his heirs and successors by law in virtue of the common citizenship of Ireland with Great Britain and his adherence to and membership of the group of nations forming the British commonwealth of nations."

"Such oath shall be taken and subscribed by every member of the parliament before taking his seat thereat, before the representative of the crown, or some person authorized by him."

FAILS TO MOVE EMPRESS IN ATTEMPT TO REFLOAT

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 3.—Another unsuccessful attempt was made this morning to refloat the C. B. R. steamer Empress, which is on Black Point ledge. In addition to the steamer's own engine, there were the tugs Margaret A. Hackett, J. A. Hackett, Piper, Springhill, Catherine K. and Helen G. also the steamer Aberdeen, but their combined efforts failed to move the liner. The tugs took hold of the Empress at 9:30 o'clock, and for one hour continued a steady pull, but then had to desist, as the tide was falling. This afternoon a section of the ledge is to be blasted away, and it is hoped that this will afford a better opportunity of moving her.

WOODSTOCK SOFTBALL.
WOODSTOCK, Oct. 3.—The second round of the championship softball series between the Business and Manufacturers, which was called in the eighth inning owing to darkness last Friday, will be replayed this week. According to a local ruling, a game must go the full nine innings before it counts, so the game is to be played over again.

Proclaim Corn Quarantine in Certain Sections of Western Ontario.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3.—(By Can.) Because of the finding of European cornborer in parts of the counties of Bruce, Halton, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Lincoln, Peel and Westmorland, and the danger of this insect being spread to other districts by movement of corn plants or portions of plants infested, a domestic quarantine has been proclaimed effective in Culross Township of county of Bruce, Turfburg Township, Huron, Trafalgar Township, Halton, Chatham, including the Gore of Chatham; Dover East and Dover West in Kent County; Dawn, Enniskillen, Moore and Sombra in Lambton County; Grimsby Township, Lincoln; Albion, Chinguacousy and Toronto townships in Peel, and Barton Township in Westmorland.

Montreal Girl Makes Two Unsuccessful Attempts To Take Her Own Life.

MONTREAL, Oct. 3.—Determined to end her life, a 15-year-old girl first tried to throw herself from a third-story window, and, on being stopped by her parents when half-way out of the window, attempted to drink a bottle of iodine, from which fatal act her parents again stopped her.

The latter, fearful of their child's life, this morning had her brought before Judge Choquet, who had her placed in a convent for a week while plans mature for her future. The reason for the girl's desire to end her life was because neighbors, concerning whom she is alleged to have spread scandal, demanded of her parents that the child furnish proof of her allegations. Worry over the situation resulted in the attempted suicide.

AYLMER MAN IS GUILTY OF THEFT

Judge D. C. Ross Deprecates Anonymous Letters Sent Him Regarding Accused.

Special to London Advertiser. ST. THOMAS, Oct. 2.—In convicting James Millard of Aylmer on four charges of stealing small amounts under \$5 from the Brown House in that town on May 30 last, Judge D. C. Ross took occasion to deprecate the practice of writing anonymous letters to him in the effort to sway his judgment.

Numerous letters of this type had been received, he said, and while he would be pleased to hear anything regarding the character of the prisoner which might recommend leniency, he warned the writers that rather than assisting the prisoner, they might do him harm.

Sentence will be imposed Saturday morning, and the application of C. St. Clair Letch to have his client released on bail was refused.

A sensation was occasioned in the court, when Mr. Letch was present, in his argument for the defense. He referred to the conduct of Mr. Zimmerman in the cases and openly insinuated that he had instituted the actions against Millard in an attempt to get out of paying the several hundred dollars that he had admitted borrowing from his former clerk, and he was inclined to think that Mr. Zimmerman had been guilty of a grave criminal offense.

"If that's not crime, I don't know the Criminal Code of Canada," stated Mr. Letch. "The whole case has developed some very unusual and extraordinary aspects, and this is one of them."

Mr. Letch challenged the presence of W. Harold Barnum of Aylmer at the trial as private prosecutor. He wished to know by what right Mr. Barnum was there and was taking part in the proceedings. The fact that he was robbed was evidence that he was there in an active capacity. Did it mean that Crown Attorney McCrimmon was incapable of handling the case alone?

Judge Ross deprecated Mr. Letch's allegations, explaining that the court was only concerned with the criminal aspect of the case and had absolutely nothing to do with any civil action that might arise. So far as the reputation of Mr. Barnum was concerned as a private prosecutor, he considered that Mr. McCrimmon was empowered to use whatever instruments he desired in conducting a case and his twenty-five years' acquaintance with Mr. Barnum would not permit him to think the latter was being made to use the criminal court to thwart the civil court.

"I might say that if Mr. Barnum, or any other barrister, ever attempted to use the criminal court for that purpose, he will have a hard time succeeding, and I would warn them that they had better not try."

His honor stated that he had no reason to disbelieve Mr. Zimmerman's evidence in the charges heard. He considered he had testified in an honest manner.

JURY DISAGREES IN PARIS TRIAL

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 3.—The fifth trial of John Paris, mulatto, of Truro, charged with the murder of Little Sadie McAuley in Riverview Park on Aug. 2, 1921, came to an end tonight, and resulted in another disagreement. The jury was discharged, and the prisoner, on motion of the attorney-general, was remanded to jail.

FORMER KING OF GREECE IN EXILE

PALERMO, Sicily, Oct. 3.—Former King Constantine of Greece, going into exile after his second abdication, arrived here at 11 o'clock this morning with the members of his party on board the Greek steamer Patria.

AMENDS DRAFT OF RESOLUTION

Methodist Delegates Tone Down Analysis of Conference's Attitude.

Change Interpretation That Conference Pledged the Youth For War.

Special to London Advertiser. TORONTO, Oct. 3.—The delegates to the Methodist Conference spent a busy afternoon in committee working. The special committee which drafted the resolution setting forth the position of the conference on the Near East situation have toned down that resolution in the hope it will pass the conference without any serious opposition. When it was held up yesterday the opposition was chiefly centered on the interpretation that it pledged the Methodist youth of the land to go to war if the Dardanelles trouble led to hostilities. Many felt that the delegates had no right to make such pledges for other persons.

Accordingly today Rev. S. G. Bland, assisted by other members of the committee made changes to meet such objections without to any great extent lessening the force of the resolution as at first drafted.

TELEPHONE CITY POPULATION FALLS

Decrease of 1,532 Noted in Past Year At Brantford—Unemployment Blamed.

Special to London Advertiser. BRANTFORD, Oct. 3.—The population of the city at the present time, according to the reports of the assessment commissioners, totals 30,109. This shows a decrease of 1,532 during the past year. It is stated that the main reason for the decrease is that many local families have left for the United States on account of there being little employment here for some time. In Mr. A. G. Ludlow's report he says: "As the majority of our plants are manufacturing agricultural implements, those particular lines were affected most by the depression. However, in my opinion, the worst is over, and normal conditions will come back quickly."

During the quarter closed on September 30, 50 short-term prisoners have been assigned to the local county jail. Eight of these were women, making 17 women to pass through this institution during the year. The offenders were mostly drunks and other offenders against the O. T. A. and petty thieves. The cost of maintenance was 19½ cents per day.

Four building permits were issued by City Engineer Adams yesterday, amounting to an approximate cost of \$555. The permits issued were as follows: J. Gancarczyk, Ann street, shed, \$25; J. T. Thompson, Dundas street, garage, \$60; J. J. Jamieson, Dan street, garage, \$450; C. V. Noble, Erie avenue, garage, \$50.

The school medical report for the month of September shows that 263 school children were examined by Dr. Alexander during the month. Of these, 179 were found to be suffering from medical defects, and were given the usual medical treatment or referred to their family physicians. Thoroughness of the report is to the effect that 109 homes were visited during the month, while from the classroom report it was found that there were the following defects: Eye disease 19, defective eyesight 71, pediculosis 20, and scabies 13.

SEEKS DAMAGES THROUGH COURT

Kitchener Agent Sues City For \$1,200 When Street Car Smashes Auto.

Special to London Advertiser. KITCHENER, Oct. 3.—A writ was served on the city today by A. B. Caya, a local manufacturer's agent, for damages amounting to \$1,200 to his motor car, which, he alleges, were occasioned when a Kitchener Waterloo street car ran into an automobile on the street and crashed the vehicle into his car which was parked at the curb. The Caya car was a total wreck. The suit will be defended by the light commission, which operates the street cars.

The assets of the Kitchener Light Commission announced here today by Secretary Clarke, in receiving verification, in the annual report of the hydro-electric power commission, are \$653,652.17, the highest figures in the history of the local commission. These are contrasted with liabilities amounting to \$253,381.56, the percentage of the net to the total assets is 33, which is considered low. The report places the local commission in the front rank financially of the commissions of the province.

The provincial highway from Centerville to Centerville was completed today, and will be allowed to set for two weeks before traffic between Kitchener and Centerville is permitted. The contractor has moved his plant to Centerville, and will start immediately on the laying of concrete between Centerville and Freepoint. He expects to complete this latter end
