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1,350 ASPIRE TO OFFICE IN FOUR-CORNERED FIGHT

Candidates Being Entered Daily by All Parties For General Election.

LLOYD GEORGE IS SICK
Former Premier Expected To Announce Intentions To Wage Open Warfare.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(By Canadian Press.)—With Mr. Lloyd George confined to his home with a sore throat, his anticipated declaration of open warfare at the polls with the Conservatives and "die-hards" was withheld tonight. But his campaign headquarters were feverishly organizing the ranks, and a dramatic announcement is expected hourly. It is claimed that by Saturday the list of regular candidates will be close to 200, while if the Tories continue to force a fight in the accepted coalition constituencies the Lloyd Georgians will retaliate by nominating 150 emergency candidates.

They are hesitating till the last minute to do this, because of fear of splitting the vote in such a way as to enable Labor to get in control. The former prime minister's adherents say that the Tories, blinded by party fever, are running for a fall.

The four-cornered fight has grown more intense, with 1,350 candidates provisionally adopted already. These are divided as follows: 461 Conservatives, 400 Labor, 320 Independent Liberals and 169 National Liberals. It is more than likely that there will be more before Saturday, as the breach is widening between the Nationals and the Conservatives.

Law To Fight Back.
The real fireworks of the campaign are expected this week-end. Prime Minister Bonar Law has promised to adopt a fighting attitude in his forthcoming speech, in order to reply to Mr. Lloyd George's sharp censure of his ministry. The former's supporters say he will take his coat off.

Ordered to remain indoors by Lord Dawson, the King's physician, Mr. Lloyd George has been forced to cancel his Bristol and Bath speeches tomorrow and Lord Birkenhead will speak in his place. He hopes, however, to keep his engagement to speak here on Saturday, when a great rally has been arranged with Austen Chamberlain and Lord Birkenhead on the platform. Herbert H. Asquith claims immense gains in both Lloyd Georgian and Bonar Law's camps, because they are unable to reach an understanding.

Neither the Conservatives, nor the Nationals wish to spread the conflict between them, but various attacks by local Conservative organizations acting on their own responsibility are causing growing irritation, and the Conservative organization has not seen it to interfere. Indications are, however, that negotiations are going on quietly with the Tories, because it is said the new cabinet fears Labor may gain at the expense of the Conservative majority. If the cabinet leaders fail to withhold the hand of the die-hards the Lloyd Georgians will throw down the gauntlet and stake on the next House of Commons.

Birkenhead's Opinion.
Lord Birkenhead said in an interview today: "The whole situation has disclosed the weakness in our representative system. If this were a presidential election and the candidates were Messrs. Bonar Law, Asquith, Lloyd George and Henderson, the Labor leader, there cannot be the slightest doubt that Lloyd George would be returned by an overwhelming majority. His difficulty is that he cannot obtain the value of his

Soon To Assume Duties As Head of C. N. R. System

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(By Canadian Press Cable.)—Sir Henry Thornton, the new president of the Canadian National Railways, will sail on the Olympic on November 22, and will take up his new duties as head of the national railways in Canada upon his arrival in the Dominion. The former general manager of the Great Eastern System has been feted since his return from Canada to wind up his business in England, preparatory to taking over his new duties, individuals and organizations vying with one another in giving him a good send-off.

Sir Henry's social engagements are keeping him pleasantly busy before he leaves for the new scene of his labors.

"Apparently the Conservative wire-pullers are encouraging us to take on many comparatively inexperienced candidates in the hope that their failure at the polls will end in Lloyd George being marooned and helpless in the next parliament."

LIBERALS SUPPORT HENDERSON.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—Arthur Henderson, Labor leader, is receiving Liberal support in his fight for re-election in Wigan against a Unionist candidate, J. H. Whitley, the speaker of the House of Commons, is not likely to be opposed in Halifax where he is running again, although local laborites are said to have been itching to break the unwritten law against opposing the speaker of the House of Commons.

Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen, the new minister of health, is having opposition in Taunton from a gentleman farmer standing as a Liberal, "who believes that agriculture would be better represented by a resident farmer than by a gentleman whose energies would be absorbed in a public department."

William Wardley, the first Labor lord mayor of Sheffield, is likely to oppose the Independent Liberal newcomer in the Hallam division of Sheffield, also Sir Frederick Sykes, Bonar Law's son-in-law, who seeks to succeed Douglas Vickers in that constituency. Mr. Vickers is chairman of the great armament firm in Sheffield.

WILL NOT PUBLISH VOTE OF RAILMEN

R. T. Tallon States Employees' Ballot On Strike To Be Kept Secret.

MONTREAL, Nov. 1.—(By Canadian Press.)—R. T. Tallon, president of division No. 4, railway employees' department, American Federation of Labor, announced this afternoon that the result of the ballot to ascertain whether the Canadian railway shopmen wish to strike or to negotiate will not be made public.

The call for another general ballot was made several weeks ago, the time limit expiring today. The officials of the division were kept busy all day counting ballots at their headquarters in this city.

"We are expecting to hear from the railway authorities as regard resuming of negotiations," said Mr. Tallon, "and in a week's time or so we shall know more definitely how matters stand."

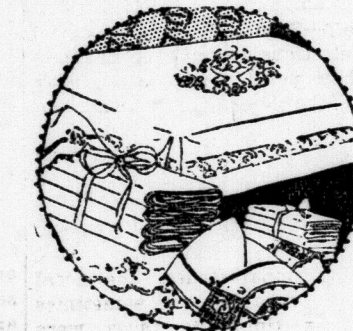

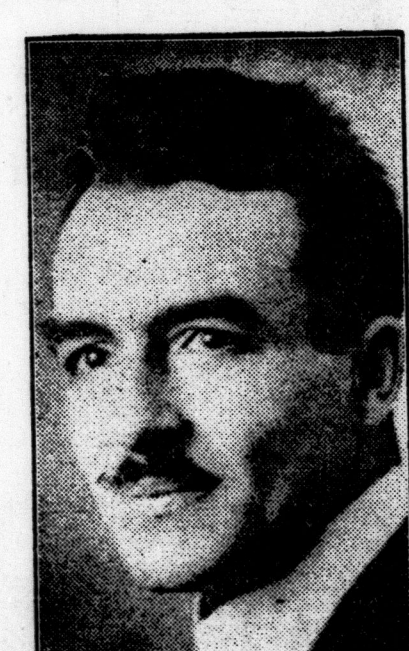
