London Presbyterial President Gives Cheering Message From Dominion Executive Board.

The deficit of the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada is wiped out. This cheering news has been brought back to the members of the W. M. S. and associated organizations in Western Ontario by the president of the London Presbyterial, Mrs. J. M. McEvoy. who has just returned home after spending a few days in Toronto.

"I met Mrs. John MacGillivray, president of the executive board of the W. M. S. of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, while in Toronto,' stated Mrs. McEvoy, "and she informed me the good news was ready for publication. We are starting a new year with a clean sheet."

The deficit was almost entirely in curred in the latter part of the war and the first years succeeding, through adverse exchange rates, in-volving about \$40,000 for the Presbyterian Women's Missionary organization in the Dominion in one year Last year the members put their shoulders to the wheel, determined that the total indebtedness of \$68,000 should be removed in short r. A strong pull and a steady has brought about the desired London Presbyterial contributed about \$1.350.
