

By H. A. GOLDMAN, C.E. ractically every businessman, and a fact every intelligent person must have observed that business condi-

tions in this country are always At certain times we enjoy grea prosperity, with nearly all industries operating to capacity; factories over-

paded with orders, and all available labor employed at attractive wages. Merchants are busy and traders are active, extravagance is witnessed on every hand; in fact, every one appears to have plenty of money, which

he is willing to spend quite freely.

Then suddenly there comes a change, and gradually we enter a period of depression which presents an entirely different picture to us. The wheels of industry come to a standstill. Thousands of workmen are thrown out of employment; are thrown out of employment; forced to walk the streets and become re being cancelled, and new ones do not appear. Merchants see their shelves overstocked with goods for which no purchasers can be found. Retailers must liquidate their mer-chandise below cost in order to meet pobligations assumed in days of pros-perity, and many business houses established after years of effort and intiring labor are forced into bankeruptcy on account of commitments ade at a time when prices were at their peak, or because of inability to realize on their stocks of goods. Then again between these extremes f prosperity and depression we have eriods of business recovery followng a depression, periods of steady lecline following prosperity, and

riods of uncertainty when business very irregular.
These changes in business condiions have been known to go on con-inuously with almost mathematical egularity, and they usually occur in following order:
