

Children Entering Schools Next September Will Be Examined by Doctor.

Recommendations made by the special health survey committee appointed by the board of education with regard to the medical examination of public schools received the unanimous indorsation of that body yesterday afternoon.

The committee, under Trustee Rev. R. D. Mess as chairman, recommended that the plan suggested by the Western Ontario Academy of medi-cine be given a year's trial, begin-ning with the school year next Sep-

ember.
The plan advanced by the academy embraces the voluntary examination of each child by the family physician upon admission to school. The examination will be performed by the members of the academy at the nominal fee of \$1, which fee will

be paid by the board.

In each case the results and infor-nation secured from the examination

mation secured from the examination will be recorded on standard forms supplied by the board and will be kept on file for future reference.

The academy of medicine is to be asked also to appeint a standing committee from among its members to act in a consultative capacity in cooperation with the board in all work work pertaining to the medical inspection of the pupils of the public schools.

The special survey committee un-der Trustee A. R. Cairncross as chairman, was empowered to have the rules and regulations of the board revised in accordance with the recommendations adopted in connection with the new administration being in augurated, based on the Brittain report, such revised regulations to be submitted to the board at a special meeting to be held the latter part of December.

The chairman of the board, Bryden N. Campbell, was appointed to com-plete the term of Trustee Rev. James Mills, LL.D., died at his residence here today, aged 84. In his death not only the province but the country suffers from his loss.

Born in 1844 near Bondhead in the count of Simcoe, of Irish, parentage Dr. Mills received little or no education until he had reached the age of years. He graduated from Victoria niversity, Cobourg, and later was eadmaster of Brantford high school

headmaster of Brantford high school and collegiate institute, and twenty-five years president of the Ontario agricultural college, Guelph.

Dr. Mills was the founder of the farmers' institutes of Ontario, which rapidly developed into a great force for the advancement of agricultural science. These institutes have now spread into every province.

Under his presidency Guelph agricultural college developed until It gained an international reputation, It can be correctly and fairly stated that Dr. Mills undoubtedly laid at Guelph the foundation of agricultural development and progress throughout the dominion, Nearly every agricultural school principal or dean in the dominion has at one time been a student of the late Dr. Mills.






