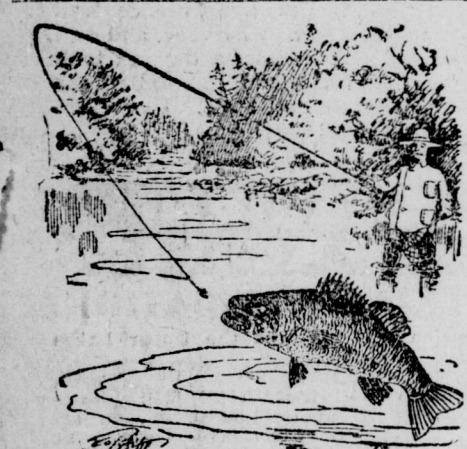

Saturday afternoon last fire broke
