Hanlan appears to think the terms good enough if he gets two-thirds of the gate money instead of one-third, as originally proposed, and pays his own expenses. He will not row in a match probably for six or eight weeks, and in the meantime intends to give a series of rowing exhibitions in the different zolonies, if terms can be satisfactorily arranged. His first exhibition will probably be given in Sydney, after which he will proceed to Melbourne and Adelaide. He is accompanied by his business agent, Morris Greenwall.
