MacWherrell has pretty much given up hope of a commutation or reprieve, and has, it is said, resigned himself to his fate. He has asked the jail surgeon, Dr. Heggie, to order him a glass of ale on the fatal morning before going to the scaffold. Nothing hasayet been done toward putting the engine of death in position, however. It will be remembered it was in process of construction last May, and was nearly completed when a reprieve came. The job was completed and a test made with a huge block of wood, and then marked and taken down and stored in the jail yard, and can be put in position again in a short time.
