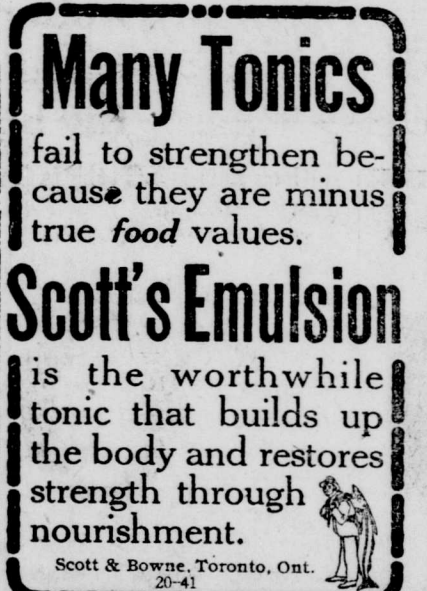
**STEP TOWARD UNION OF
BAPTISTS IN CANADA**
Executive's Memorial Indorsing Principle Adopted Unanimously at
Brantford
BRANTFORD, Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—At the closing session of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec here this afternoon the first step toward the union of all Baptists in Canada was taken. A memorial from the National General Executive of the three Baptist conventions of Canada indorsed the principle of union and was unanimously adopted. The convention is requested to have full and free discussions at their next annual meetings on the union question. The chief aim of the proposed union is to furnish a medium through which the Baptists of this country may speak with one voice on matters of national moment.

**HUNGARY ALLOWED TO
DELAY TREATY SIGNING**
PARIS, Oct. 28.—(Special to The Press).—Reorganization of the trade commissioner service in Great Britain will be considered by Sir George Foster incidental to his trip to Geneva as a Canadian delegate to the League of Nations assembly. Conditions over there as affecting trade have been much discussed and considerably criticized. The Canadian trade mission, which followed the war and headed considerable business in the direction of Canada, gradually faded away and was replaced by an overseas branch of the trade and commerce department co-operating with (fide agents in the United Kingdom) by reason of exchange and other conditions there is a demand to stir things up.

**FAVOR CONTINUANCE
OF STOCKS EMBARGO**
Montreal Brokers Approve Action Taken in Overseas Securities by Finance Minister
MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—Several hundred members of the banking, stock brokerage, bond houses and other interests connected with the financial community here gathered to-day after close of business on the floor of the stock exchange, under the chairmanship of Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, of the Bank of Montreal, to hear Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, express his views on the necessity of continuing the so-called "embargo" on the sale in Canada of overseas-held Canadian securities.

**BRITISH AND FRENCH
PLAN OIL MERGER**
LONDON, Oct. 28.—Announcement of the signing of an agreement by French group and the Anglo-Persian Oil Company for development on a large scale of oil supplies from British sources is made by The London Times. The project contemplates the creation of a fleet of tank steamers flying the French flag, and the establishment of large storage tanks at the principal ports of France. A French company, with capital amounting to 100,000,000 francs, is said to be in the process of organizing for importing to France crude oil and refined oil and for refining and distributing gasoline, kerosene and fuel oil.

INJURY TO FOOT FATAL
Oxford County Lad Succumbs to Blood Poison From Nail
INGERSOLL, Oct. 28.—Walter, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Courtney Fleming, North Oxford, died this morning as a result of running a nail in his foot on Saturday. Blood poisoning and tetanus developed, the former within a few hours of the mishap.

FIRST SNOW OF YEAR
Falls in Middle States—Heavy Frosts in Texas and Oklahoma
CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Reports of the first snowfall of the winter were received to-day by the weather bureau from points in Northern Missouri, Iowa and down-state regions in Illinois. Heavy frosts were reported in Northern Texas and Oklahoma.

LOUIS M. GRIER DIES
LONDON, Oct. 28.—(Associated Press Cable).—The death occurred to-day at St. Ives of Louis Munro Grier, artist, formerly engaged in banking in Canada.

EARTHQUAKE IN S. AMERICA
VALPARAISO, Oct. 29.—Violent earthquake shocks, with a vertical movement shook the provinces of Atacama and Coquimbo north of this city, at 8.05 o'clock this morning. The tremors lasting two half minutes. No one was injured.

When The Sea Gives Up Its Dead
A Talk On Thanksgiving

Do you really give thanks?
What does Thanksgiving mean to you? Has it any spiritual significance, or is it merely an occasion for feasting?

It is not our purpose to preach, but it is our purpose to bring home to you some things for which, as a Canadian, you should give thanks.

Consider your welfare in contrast to the hopelessness of many Europeans, remembering that but for the spiritual and personal sacrifice of hundreds of thousands of our Soldiers and Seamen, Canada might be suffering as Europe is to-day.

Then consider those who still bear the loss of husbands and fathers and sons and who must continue to suffer this loss until the sea gives up its dead.

There are, in this country, wives and mothers and children whose husbands and sons and fathers just as surely laid down their lives for Canada's welfare and protection as did soldiers and sailors who died in battle.

Canada's Merchant Sailors—the unsung dead—the plain men of undaunted courage and spirit, who won for their grave the boundless deep. Cypress nor Yew shall weave for them their shade. Their memory is graven in the lonely hearts of waiting women and uncomprehending childhood.

During the war the people of Canada undertook to provide for such as these. They are the people's charge. The Navy League is merely their trustee—you are their hope and their refuge.

Special Note.
After this year, the League expects to cease asking for funds for the relief of the Canadian dependents of Merchant Sailors who were killed on Active Service. With the Trust Funds now in hand, together with the sum set aside in the Budget, to be raised by public subscription this week, it should be possible to establish an endowment, the income from which will be sufficient to provide for these dependents until the need no longer exists.

But as many of these dependents are young children, the endowment must continue for a number of years, until they become self-supporting.

Why Foreign Countries Anxiously Watch Next Tuesday's Election

Never before has an American election been fraught with so much meaning to the rest of the world, to judge from the anxiety evident in the comment of the foreign press. In fact, this became so evident as the campaign went on that THE LITERARY DIGEST sent out an inquiry to the press abroad asking their views on our political struggle.

A Valuable Colored Map of Czecho-Slovakia

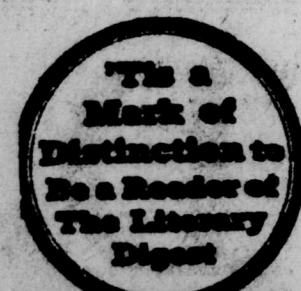
Accompanying This Is a Small Sketch Map of Central Europe Showing the Location of Czecho-Slovakia.
