

The Lambton County Pure Bred Livestock Association held their first sale on Wednesday, February 28th, in Petrolia. The breeders aim to make this an annual event as is done in some other Ontario counties. All the animals advertised were on sale with the exception of one of R. Minielly's which was sick, and two that N. Cascaden was contributing. These two were accidentally killed when being brought to the sale. The highest price of the day was paid by Angus Stonehouse of Wyoming, for Royal Marquis. This bull is a splendid specimen of the Short-horn breed and was contributed by Murray Leach, of Petrolia. The price paid was \$165. The fine weather brought out a large crowd, over one thousand people being present. Capt. T. E. Robson, of London, wielded the hammer to the satisfaction of all. 
