Mount Desert.
This place has within a few years grown to be one of the most frequent and attractive watering places in the United States. As a summer resort it is already a rival to Newport, Saratoga, or Long Branch.

Mount Desert is 157 feet high and about 14 miles wide, nearly round, dotted all over with cottages and private residences. Some of which cost \$30,000 to \$50,000, some 25 hotels, one

of which is on the top of Green Mount, the highest on the island, and is reached by a railroad running to the very summit. Here is one of the grandest views of land and ocean to be seen.

The entire coast is strown with islands, large and small; some of the largest Deer Island and others. All more or less occupied as summer residences.

The Maine Central Railway will have 3 trains running daily from Bar Harbor (Mt. Desert) through to Bangor, via: first, at 6 o'clock, at 10 o'clock, at 2 o'clock.
