Nova Scotia's Farmer's Association at Middleton

The eleventh annual convention of the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association opened in Morrison's Hall, Middleton, Tuesday (January 29th) evening, nearly four hundred persons being present. After the address by President Miles Chipman, Lieutenant Governor Fraser was introduced and gave a very instructive and eloquent address which was highly appreciated and loudly applauded.

Professor J. H. Grisdale followed with a practical address abounding in information upon the improvement of the dairy herd. This morning's session was occupied in presenting the Secretary's report, the records of the County Farmers' Associations, the report of the directors and discussions. Prof. Grisdale's address on the "Rotation of Crops" was next in order and concluded the morning's work.

The address of Governor Fraser and Professor Grisdale will be given in a subsequent issue of the Monitor.

At the Wednesday morning session the attendance was nearly as large as the previous evening. The report of the directors was submitted.

Verbal reports of an encouraging nature were given from County associations. Then followed a very instructive address on Rotation of Crops by Prof. Grisdale. For three quarters of an hour after the close of his address the Professor answered questions which came thick and fast from the audience.

At the session on Wednesday afternoon the report of the association exhibition commissioners, Messrs. Logan and Corning submitted by Mr. Logan said that although the exhibition in 1906 at Halifax could not be said to represent the records of our Dominion, yet it was a success considered from all points. Treasurer's Report.

THE TOWN OF BRIDGETOWN.

Financial Year Ended December 31st, 1906.

(Continued from last week.)

We, the undersigned, the auditors appointed by the town council of the town of Bridgetown to audit the accounts of the town for the year 1906, do hereby report as follows:

We have commenced with the assessment roll of the town for the year 1906, and have carefully examined the making up of the taxes and find that the same were correctly made up. We have checked the amounts charged for taxes with the Simmonds' compiled and find the same correct. We have compared the taxes for the year remaining unpaid December 31st, 1906, and show \$1056.79 still remaining unpaid. We also show the amount of water charges remaining unpaid at the end of the year. The amounts remaining unpaid at the end of the year have at the time of completing our audit in the sewer construction accounts, the former of which is the Union Bank of Halifax on account of the sewer construction and the water construction as far as it has gone.

Taxes for 1906 unpaid December 31st, 1906, \$1,056.79
Water charges unpaid December 31st, 1906, 1,018.54
There is an overdraft in the Bank of Nova Scotia of \$681.39, but there is cash on hand of \$278.41. The overdraft at the beginning of the year was \$2,977.77, with \$1,232.22 cash on hand, leaving a net overdraft at the beginning of the year of \$2,499.29.

We find that the statements here to annex are complete and correct in every particular. Our work has been largely increased this year on account of the sewer and water construction accounts, the former of which is very large, and we have, if possible, been more thorough in our audit than ever before.
