MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

Annual Session Held in Annapolis Royal.

Wednesday Afternoon.
Council met at 2.30 P. M. All Councillors present. Minutes of previous session read and approved.

Ordered that Councillors Bishop, Thomas, and the Treasurer and the Warden be the Arbitration Committee.

Ordered that The Warden, Deputy Warden and Councillors E. C. Shaffner, Piggott, and Foster be the delegates to the Union Municipalities.

Ordered that the lists of officers as handed in to the Clerk be the officers for the ensuing year.

The following resolution for encouragement of new industries in the Municipality was moved by Councillor Bishop, Seconded by Councillor Piggott and adopted by Council.

The report of the Finance Committee was read and on motion received and adopted.

Regarding the breaking of roads in Winter.

Sec. 32 sub. sec. 2 & 3. of the Public Highway Act defines the duties of the overseer and makes liable for winter breaking all persons between 18 and 60 years of age. Penalty for non-compliance of above provisions ten dollars.

Ordered that the Parker Mountain Road, beginning at the Granville Highway and extending to the top of the said Parker Mountain, be added to road section No. 3 in Ward No. 6.

Ordered that Councillors Constan, Thomas, and E. C. Shaffner be a Committee to report at the April Session on the revision of the regulations for registry of ear marks for neat cattle and sheep.

Council adjourned sine die.

Resolution re Construction of a Bridge: Annapolis Royal.

WHEREAS:—The Municipality of the Town of Annapolis Royal, and the Municipality of Annapolis County at regular January meetings have appointed a joint Committee for the purpose of urging upon the Government of Nova Scotia the necessity of con-

structing a bridge across the Annapolis River between Annapolis Royal and Granville Ferry, and WHEREAS:—The promise has been made by a Member of the Government that the said bridge would be built; and in accordance with requests from the Department of Public Works, the Municipality of Annapolis Royal has acquired and deeded a right of way to the proposed site of the bridge on the Annapolis side of the river, and the Municipality of Annapolis County has provided a like right of way on the Granville side of the River to the Crown, and

WHEREAS:—This important matter has been held over owing to War conditions that are now happily settled; and the attention of Manufacturers is directed to civil work, and construction in Canada:

THEREFORE RESOLVED:—That this Committee with the approval and sanction of both Municipalities urge upon the Government of Nova Scotia the necessity of an early construction of this bridge; and that the work should take first place in "after the War" construction in Nova Scotia.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED:—That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Premier, and Members of the Government, respectfully asking that the request made has the prompt and full consideration that it deserves and that it will lead to the early erection and completion of the Bridge across the Annapolis River.
