HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Excellency, that the public convenience would be promoted if the Custom House Station at Esquimaux Point, which is situate in closer proximity to the Port of Gaspé, than to that of Quebec, with which it is now connected, was detached from the last mentioned Port and erected into an Out Port of Entry, and placed under the survey of the Port of Gaspé.

His Excellency the Governor General, on the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Customs, and under and in pursuance of the 8th section of the Act 31st Victoria, Cap. 6, intitled: "An Act respecting the Customs," has been pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered, that on from and after the First day of April, inst., the Port of Esquimaux Point shall be, and is hereby detached from the Port of Quebec, and placed under the survey of the Port of Gaspé, in the Province of Quebec.

98 miles by Railroad from Toronto to Collingwood.

533 miles by Steamer from Collingwood to Fort William.

45 miles by Waggon from Fort William to Shebandowan Lake.

310 miles broken navigation in open boats from Shebandowan Lake to Northwest Angle of the Lake of the Woods.

95 miles by Cart or Waggon from North-west Angle, Lake of the Woods, to Fort Garry.
