MEDICARE—AUTHORIZATION OF CONTRIBU-TIONS TOWARD COST OF INSURED MEDICAL CARE

The house resumed consideration of the motion of Mr. MacEachen for the second reading of Bill C-227, to authorize the payment of contributions by Canada toward the cost of insured medical care services incurred by provinces pursuant to provincial medical care insurance plans, and the amendment thereto of Mr. Rynard.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Order, please. The hon. member for Fraser Valley.

Mr. A. B. Patterson (Fraser Valley): Mr. Speaker, the bill which we now have before us, Bill C-227, brings to our attention a matter of great importance and one which has been under discussion on many platforms and in many forums across the country for a number of years. While very few if any would question the need for some definite pursuant to provisional standing order 39A, plan under which the best medical care is to inform the house that the questions to be made available to every person requiring it, there is a wide divergence of opinion concerning the best and most effective way to achieve that objective. I suppose in this regard most people would fall into one of two categories; first, those who support the idea of a government sponsored, government operated, compulsory health insurance program or, on the other hand, a voluntary plan with government assistance for those who cannot afford to provide health insurance for themselves.
