Also, I want to say that if some conditions are foreseen, such as in the case of thalidomide babies or congenital diseases, I do not think it would be advisable for Canada to allow such beings to be born.

In my opinion, this is going much too far in a society where there is room for all those who are allowed to be born.

Such considerations should prompt us to be very careful and to ask all hon. members to think twice before doing anything to make abortion available upon request.

Mr. Léonel Beaudoin (Richmond): Mr. Speaker, I had prepared a 20-minute speech, but, so as not to delay the business of the house and to allow members to enjoy a longer week-end—they all have a lot to do during the week-end—I shall refrain from making this speech.

However, before resuming my seat I want to congratulate my hon. colleagues for having so ably shown that the object of this amendment was to delete clause 18 from the bill. I am in favour of the suppression of clause 18 and I shall vote accordingly.

Mr. Speaker: The question is on motion No. 38 (Mr. Rodrigue) which reads:

That Bill C-150, an act to amend the Criminal Code, the Parole Act, the Penitentiary Act, the Prisons and Reformatories Act and to make certain consequential amendments to the Combines Investigation Act, the Customs Tariff and the National Defence Act, be amended by deleting in clause 18 the words "a majority" in lines 38 and 39 on page 42 and substituting therefor the words: "unanimous decision".
