Mr. Baldwin: The minister's speech was terrible.

It said that Canada probably has the highest rate of unemployment of the more industrially advanced nations. Do you know what this means, Mr. Speaker? It means the loss of our valuable human resources, the loss of productivity and the loss of taxes. And what did the Minister of Finance say?
