Brian Mulroney (Prime Minister):** Mr. Speaker, I think I could probably speak for all members of the House when I say to my hon. friend that the reputation of the Deputy Prime Minister with respect to the protection of individual and human rights is an absolutely outstanding one. I know my hon. friend will want to withdraw any suggestion to the contrary.
