FOUR ALDERMEN FOR FIRST WARD

Special Committee on Ward Redistribution Will Apply for Legislation.

WILL NOT SUBDIVIDE

Commissioner Forman's Alternative Found Favor—Beaches' Representation.

The formation of two wards out of Ward One and the enlargement of Ward Seven by giving it the York Beach district now in Ward Six, were considered yesterday at a meeting of the Ald. Robbins' special committee on redistribution of wards. This plan of redistribution was reported by Commissioner Forman and City Clerk Littlejohn. Greenwood avenue was suggested as the dividing line for the two wards out of Ward One. "By 1916 Ward One will have 100,000 people, or practically one-fifth of the city's population," Ald. Robbins said. "Construction of the Bloor street viaduct will undoubtedly compel the annexation of Todmorden district." City Clerk Littlejohn insisted that every ward should have an equal number of aldermen. "In ten years there will be three wards east of the Don river," F. Baker declared. "There is a residential section east of the city limits, running up from the lake to the heights, that now sells at Rosedale prices."

Income Blanks Are Being Distributed

From the assessment department are now being distributed to hundreds of citizens the blanks which are to be filled in as a sworn statement of the amount of income that is assessable. The blanks, which are returned to the department, are accepted face value. How many blanks go into waste paper baskets is of course known to the department. It all means that civic revenues from assessable incomes are the least dependable of all revenues. The public-spirited men form the class who are prompt to return sworn statements of assessable income.

Ald. McBride wanted a delay for more consideration of the proposed redistribution, but Ald. Robbins insisted that the heads of departments had given full consideration to the change. When it looked as tho the committee could not agree upon anything proposed, Commissioner Forman suggested an alternative that Ward One be given four aldermen instead of three. Ald. Robbins, however, pointed out that the Beaches especially require more representation, and there would be no assurance that the fourth alderman would be selected from the Beaches. Controller McCarthy suggested that Ward One be divided into two wards next January, with two aldermen to each, and that the boundaries of the other wards be not changed. It was decided to apply for legislation to give Ward One four aldermen.

WORKS DEPARTMENT IS NOT HARD HIT

Records Badly Kept and Office Staff Overcrowded—Contract Figures Lacking.

STENOGRAPHIC BUREAU

Recommended by Civic Survey Commission—Costly Delay in Paying Bills.

The Civic Survey reports dealing with the works department are not so drastic or severe as those which were recently handed out in connection with the fire department. Two more sections of the works report were handed over yesterday, covering organization and equipment, accounting and reporting and special subjects. The report finds that appropriations for specific work are frequently exceeded without proper authority, that the books of the "F. and D." or accounts receivable ledger do not agree with those of the general ledger of the treasurer. The former had not been balanced since 1910. Comments are made upon the fact that complete records concerning contracts are lacking and the numbering system with an indicative letter is suggested as a remedy. Under the present system it is impossible to determine the cost per square yard of pavements laid, and thereby determine the relative efficiency of contract work versus day labor.

TRUE AD WRITING PAYS IN LONG RUN

Dr. P. H. Wiley Gives Toronto Ad Club Some Ethical Pointers.

PUBLIC GROWING WISE

Has Been Fooled Too Often—Ad Should Not Exaggerate.

An appeal for truth in advertising, to replace the widespread misrepresentation and exaggeration at present in vogue, was made by Dr. P. H. Wiley, former chief of the Pure Food Bureau of the United States, before the Ad Club at the Grand Union Hotel last night. In opening his address Dr. Wiley expressed his sympathy with the citizens of Canada in the loss of Lord Strathcona, whom he held up as a model for all young men, and in the illness of Ontario's premier, Sir James Whitney. "Feeling the Public is Bad," Dr. Wiley, who was one of the pioneers in the reformation of ad writing, explained that the public had been so often fooled by advertising that they have almost reached the point where they characterize every advertisement as a lie. He stated that if the immense amount of advertising that is being done all over the world at the present time is to continue in the long run, truth in advertising would be much more profitable than wholesale misrepresentation. "A good article will sell itself," he said, "its merits should not be exaggerated, but the advertisement should state principally where this good article can be purchased." Produce Pure Foods. He strongly advocated the production of pure foods, as conducive to the health of the citizens of the country, a far more important consideration than the accumulation of wealth. He noted the fact that President Woodrow Wilson was the first president of the United States who had expressed the intention in his inaugural address, of making the promotion of the health and welfare of the citizens his chief aim, and that he had done this only after the same statement had been made by the Duke of Connaught. The same applies to pumping water by steam and electricity. Stores Loosely Handled. The method of keeping track of stores is criticized, and it is pointed out that an inventory taken at the beginning of the current fiscal year fails to agree with the previous year's. The annual report of 1911, which was delayed nearly a year in preparation, is to be declared of no value for a current audit, and is useful for historical purposes only. Delay in Payment of Bills is Blamed for considerable added expense to the city, because accounts have first to be passed by the works committee and the council. Officer Overcrowded. Referring to equipment, the report finds that the officers are overcrowded in a way which endangers the health of the clerical staff, and that the noise of the typewriters hinders the work of bookkeeping. The establishment and segregation of a central stenographic bureau for all departments is advocated. It is also estimated that the work of issuing permits should be centralized at a saving of more than \$8000 a year. The work of draughtsmen and surveyors should be treated in like manner, as well as the inspection corps.
