

# SAYS CONFERENCE

Cannot Accept Commission

Conference at Elm Street Methodist Church yesterday.

The report of the temperance committee in referring to the temperance legislation recently passed by the Ontario Government said: "Instead of closing the bars the government appointed a commission of five men to take over and perform the duties of the local license boards. The personnel of the commission is commendable, and we believe they are endeavoring to perform the duties prescribed for them faithfully, but the Methodist Church cannot accept the appointment of this

My gardeners can readily think of one place where a deep royal purple border is strictly in keeping with the solemn surroundings, but that is not the ok around them this summer and study what they will love best for next ear, and yes, even buy a box or two f one kind or the other just to try out heir luck this summer. Did I mention in yesterday's talk that all these borders are suitable in odd clumps for a snug little spot in the lower reaches of your rockery?
