CUT OFF LICENSES SAYS CONFERENCE

Cannot Accept Commission as Fulfillment of Government's Duty.

HITS TOBACCO GIVING

Surprise Caused by Rev. Geo. Purchase When He Attacked Practice.

Ontario's attitude respecting the liquor trade during the war was the chief feature at the Toronto Methodist Conference at Elm Street Methodist Church yesterday.

The report of the temperance committee in referring to the temperance legislation recently passed by the Ontario Government said: "Instead of closing the bars the government appointed a commission to cut off licenses to take over and perform the duties of the local license boards. The personnel of the commission is commendable, and we believe they are endeavoring to perform the duties prescribed for them faithfully, but the Methodist Church cannot accept the appointment of this commission as a fulfillment, or even a partial fulfillment, of the government's duty to the country at this time of strain and stress."

The following resolution, moved by Rev. J. A. Rankin and seconded by Rev. Dr. Speer, was passed: "That this conference recognizes and appreciates to the full, all efforts made by the provincial commission to cut off licenses when the traffic has become extremely vulgar and degrading, and by cancelling licenses in the Niagara district when the soldiers are in training. Plants Suitable for Borders

(Continued.) Sweet Alyssum and Candytuft.

As we pointed out yesterday, although rather late now to be planting borders, yet those who are in the late list may look around them this summer and study what they will love best for next year, and even buy a box or two of one kind or the other just to try out their luck this summer.

Like everything else it is never too late to garden—or try.

Now, Sweet Alyssum is an annual that stands pre-eminent as a snow-white borderer, and those who do not tire of a perpetual line of white around one or other of their beds may count on this plant to give them all the blossoms they can attend to in one short spring, summer and fall.

ARMY MEDICAL CORPS REQUIRES SOME HELP. Body of Earnest Women Advance Request That Provision Be Made for Members.

Yesterday afternoon a body of very earnest women met at the home of Mrs. Pentecost, 407 Huron street, to discuss the need of adding to the things they have already done to increase the limited resources of the Army Medical Corps who let Canada be the first contingent. The members of the Ladies' Auxiliary, with their president, Mrs. J. D. Fotheringham, are for the most part the wives or other relatives of doctors or others in service at the front, and are directly in touch with those for whom they ask the interest of the public.

There are 1222 non-commissioned officers and men and ninety-six officers in this branch of the service to give them anything outside the government allowance. Many things are wanted, the big thing being guns, and besides this, tobacco and surgical supplies are needed on every hand. An appeal for these as well as money is now sent out by this Ladies' Auxiliary of the Army Medical Corps. It is the intention to send the tobacco by parcel post, the expense to be borne by a small fund now in hand.

Contributions of tobacco, surgical supplies and money will be thankfully received by Mrs. J. D. Fotheringham, 20 Wellesley street.
