INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION IN GER-

Cologne is perhaps a fair sample of all the cities of the empire in its educational facilities along industrial lines. Among the principal educational institutions of this kind is the Royal United Machine-Building School, which undertakes to prepare candidates for superintending the building and installation of all kinds of machinery. There are evening and Sunday classes for those not able to attend at other times; and there are special courses dealing

of all kinds and the superintendence of gas works. Admission to these courses is open to any one who has worked as an apprentice in a shop, doing practical work, advancement from one class to another being granted after examination. The fees are \$23.80 per annum to citizens, and \$119 to foreigners. In certain cases tuition is free. E. pupil is insured against accident death, the premium per quarter being thirty cents. The state also provides a school for teaching architecture and building, and the students are taught the use of tools

as well as the tenory of designing.

A school in which pupils are prepared for a career in industrial and decoratthe art is also one of the features of the state educational system. The pup-il entering this school is supposed to make a life work of what he or she is taught, for women are given equal fa-clittles with men. The course for a dioloma is four years and the tuition only \$10 per annum for natives and \$50 for foreigners. Practical training is given in drawing, painting in water colors and oil, designing of decorations, friezes, wallpaper, curtains, carpets, linoleum, clay i odeling, wood carving, etc. The practical work is supplemented by daily lectures on the theory of each trade and the instruction is very

In Wermelskirchen, a short distance from Cologne, the government has a school for teaching shoemaking. Aling shoes is most highly developed in the United States and that all other nations copy its methods and forms, it is a fact that students from Lynn, Mass., and other cities near the centre of the shoenaking industry come to this school to be taught. The difference between an American workman and a German who has attended this school is that, while the American is an expert in doing one thing, the German has been taught how to buy leather, how to cut to the best advantage, and has been given a tiroro course in the making of shoes from start to finish. He can operate any machine and perform any manipulation required. The course, like all others, takes from three to four years. This school is expected to graduate men able to

take charge of any shoe factory. A boy who is to follow a business career is not given a haphazard course of instruction. He goes to a special commercial school from the first day until he graduates from the commercial high school. The most celebrated and best equipped school of this kind in Germany is located in Cologne. The last semester the attendance numbered 1221 students from all parts of Ger-many, and there were also eighty-two foreigners. The faculty includes about fifty professors and tutors. The list of studies embraces: Political economy, public law, geography, French language and literature, science of insurance, mechanics and electrotechnics, trade technics, English language and literature, English commercial correspondence, common law, pedagogy, botboard of trade, library, handling merchandise, textile industry, mail and telegraph, trade laws, newspaper trade, protection of workmen and charitable institutions, tariff, insurance and mut-

ual protection societies, measures, weights and minting, esthetics, history of business, English, French and German stenography, chemistry, (with one of the finest laboratories in Germany) voice building and oratory, philosophy anatomy and physiology, hygiene, Ger man literature, archeology, mining, history of arctitecure, metorology, history of arts, taxation, ophthalmia, city building, surgery, music (theory)
Feyntology, zoology and diseases, of the skin. The following languages are also taught: Chinese, Japanese, Port-ugese, new Arabic, Turkish, new Per-

sian. German to foreigners, Dutch, Russian, Italian and Spanish. Lectures are given on many subjects not enumerated and may be attended by anyone upon payment of \$2.38 for the semester or twenty-five cents a single lecture. The tuition is less than \$100 per year. It is supposed that all pupils have graduated from the com-mercial "real schools" (Realschulen)

before entering here. The state also attends to the examination of all candidates for master or foreman in all the trades. No man can give himself out as a mester workman without showing his diploma or cer-tificate as authority for the claim. There is more efficiency and real know-dee to be found among men possessing these certificates than among the average run of workmen who have not taken the examinations.




