## IMPORTANT MILITARY **ORDERS ANNOUNCED**

Instructions issued by Toronto headquarters on authority of Ottawa deal with the matter of members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force who wish to transfer to the Royal Air Force as flight-cadets or mechanics. The non-commissioned officers and

men who wish to transfer for the men who wish to transfer for the purpose of becoming flight-cadets will be listed as not available for overseas drafts. If they are rejected, by the Royal Air Force their names will be crossed off the list. If approved by the R. A. F., their names will be re-tained on the list of men not available for overseas drafts but they will not pass out of C.E.F. control until it is definitely known that they have filled all the R.A.F. requirements. 




